MINIMUM GENERAL REQUIREMENTS: The minimum requirements for graduation include 124 semester hours of which 60 hours must be from a four year university. In addition, 45 semester hours must be upper division and 30 hours in residence at PSU (including 24 of the last 30). Minimum GPA is 2.0 overall, 2.0 in the major and minor, and 2.0 in the resident courses at PSU. Requirements for all Baccalaureate Degrees are listed on page 47 of the 2003-2005 University Catalog. General Education requirements are listed on page 48. BSED degree students (those planning to teach) should also see pages 48, 49, and 189-195 for additional requirements.
