PSU Celebrates Case New Holland (CNH) Donations Made to the Diesel/Heavy Equipment Program

Grads give back to Automotive Tech program in big way

Three of the first students to attend classes in the Kansas Technology Center had such a transformative experience, they reciprocated — and in a big way.

As graduates, Dallas Grothusen ('00), Kelly Burgess ('01), and Ted Polzer ('02), went on to become leaders with CNH Industrial. On Wednesday, they returned to campus to help the Department of Automotive Technology officially unveil nearly \$300,000 worth of heavy equipment donated by the three.

PSU President Steve Scott described the donation as an investment.

"They benefited from the investment other people have made, and now full circle they're coming back to help that next generation," Scott said. "It's not just a donation, it's an invest-



ment in our students, in Pittsburg State University, and in CNH – the better our graduates are, the better your business is going to be."

Tim Dell, professor in Automotive Technology, said that 20 years ago when the Diesel and Heavy Equipment program



was in its infancy, there were engines that students could disassemble and run, but there wasn't a single machine.

Wednesday's gift included a Case 521 F Wheel Loader valued at \$100,000, a Case CX17C mini excavator worth \$26,000, a New Holland C232 rubber track loader valued at \$40,000, a New Holland M428 Telehandler worth \$40,000, a Case IH 75C utility tractor worth \$30,000, a New Holland LV80 loader scraper valued at \$18,500, a New Holland TC33 compact utility tractor worth \$14,000, and a 586E forklift valued at \$13,500.

"We really can't teach a lot of this stuff if we're sitting in the class room. These machines and this equipment are used in our lab settings, outside and indoors, so that students have those hands on opportunities to learn," said John Thompson, chair of the Automotive Technology Program.

Pitt State Hosts 5th Annual Regional State Skills Competition

The PSU Automotive Department once again held their annual Regional Automotive contest on February 26th, 2019. This yearly event provides opportunities for area high school students to practice their automotive skills prior to entering their respective state Skills-USA Automotive contests. This also provides an opportunity for





these students to tour our Automotive Department and learn about the opportunities here at PSU. Twenty-four contestants participated from seven area schools. Prizes and scholarships were awarded to the top three place winners including a \$1000 scholarship for first place, \$750 for second place, and \$500 for third place.

BAJA Competes at National Competition in Cookeville, Tennessee

The PSU Baja team competed in April in Cookeville, TN. This year's competition vehicle was finished just days before heading to the event. Students from the Automotive Technology program worked hand in hand with Engineering Technology students to complete the vehicle.

Chauncey Pennington, the lead faculty advisor for the team, said "We are super proud of the students and the work they did this year meeting or beating some of their goals, even if they didn't all work out as planned". He reminds us that the learning comes from the journey, not the finish. Some of the engineering advancements to this year's vehicle are:

- Shaved over 100lbs off the car from last year
- Custom metal cast front spindles to try and improve the turning radius
- Built a new transmission to improve the overall gear ratio and acceleration

The team placed 52nd overall of 100 teams, with highlights of 45th in the Endurance race and 20th in the Sled Pull.





The students every year are required to raise the funds in order to build and race the car. This adds a considerable amount of stress to the project with students needing to raise approximately \$1200 each. How can you help? Different levels of sponsorship are available. Industrial Tours Class Visits Indianapolis Speedway, Ford Museum and Rouge Plant, and General Motors



This semester the Department of Automotive Technology embarked on an "Industrial Tour" trip encompassing approximately 2400 miles with stops in Indianapolis, IN, Detroit, and Dearborn, MI. The group consisted of 22 students and two instructors. The first stop was to the Indianapolis Speedway track and museum where students got to hear about the history of the Indianapolis 500 and kiss the bricks at the finish line which is tradition for all winners. The next stop was to Dearborn, MI to go through the Henry Ford museum and Greenfield Village. The next day they toured the Ford Rouge Plant and visited Ford Technical Assistance Center where they sat in on calls with tech advisors and met up with some Gorilla alumni. The next day the group went to the GM Milford Proving Grounds to see vehicles being tested, including the all new Corvette with disguise on it. The group also visited the GM Propulsion facility where they saw more Gorilla alums.

Many students commented that this was the "best trip" they had ever been on. As a department, we are working hard to bring these experiences to our students to enlighten them as to all the career opportunities they have.



The Department of Automotive Technology is seeking to expand and improve our facilities in the following three ways:

1.) Outdoor Vehicle Delivery Lab: Our "Dealership and Corporate Transportation" emphasis (previously "Service Management and Marketing) is in need of a Vehicle Delivery Lab for the "Dealership Sales Operations" course. The lab would be located northeast of the department office. Cost estimates are about \$30,000.

2.) **Department office remodel**: As the department continues to position itself to be a School of Transportation, plans have been made and estimates given to reformat the main office to better allow space for guests, prospective students/parents, faculty offices, and copier/kitchen area. The remodel will provide an additional coordinator office. The cost estimate is \$10,500.

3.) **Display our history**: The automotive program can be dated back before 1915 and we'd like to display it! We hope to line our hallways with pictures of our great past, not only honor those who came before us, but to also show our guests our rich history of training automotive technicians and managers. We would like to display about 10-12 pictures but they cost about \$300 each to size and frame.
