Dírector Note Megan Westhoff

In high school, I was first introduced to Noël Coward when I saw a production of *Blithe Spirit*. I was captivated by his witty wordplay, intellectual jabs, and his crafting of fully developed characters and well-structured scenes. As many times as I have seen the play throughout my life, I never read the script until last year and uncovered so much I never knew about Coward and his play.

Coward wrote the play in six days in 1941 during the height of World War II while Londoners were enduring the Blitz. There is no mention in the play of what was happening at the time because it was intended as a happy diversion from the terrors of war and the harsh realities of life. The title comes from the poem "To a Skylark" by Percy Bysshe Shelley, which begins "Hail to thee, blithe Spirit!" The word "blithe" means happily lighthearted or without worry. So who is the blithe spirit Coward is referring to? Is it one of the characters in the play, or could it be us, the audience? Should all of us take a little time to relax and share a laugh with those around us even in the most challenging of times? I'll let you figure out the answer to those questions as I hope you sit back, relax, escape for a moment, and enjoy the show!

Costume Desígner Note Lísa Quínteros

The costume design and style for *Blithe Spirit* is a slice out of the late 1930's, and an almost realistic view of clothing of the time. What is notable about *Blithe Spirit* is perhaps what you don't see. There aren't any wartime mentionables: soldier outfits, or overly patriotic icons parading across the stage. It was an escape into a world that could be, not the world that was.

Britain had only just recently emerged from the endless cascade of bombing known as the Blitz, and were figuring how to recover and rally. Rationing became a necessity.

This escape into the stage world let people relax and laugh, and forget about what was beyond the theatre doors.

So the style of Blithe Spirit is a mash-up of 20's and 30's and a touch of 40's, but only what they would have had available to them at the time. The notable exception is perhaps Madame A.... (she's just a strange lady..... just a bit into the bizarre!)

We dove into a rich array of tasks, including period sets and fabric styles and props, new make-up looks, and newly created special effects, so this was a challenging but educational time working with crew!


