The 2017-2018 season begins October 19-22 with bobrauschenbergamerica, Charles Mee's

celebration of the famous collage artist, Bob Rauschenberg, and the broader collage that is America. It is a joyous celebration of America staged liked a living collage. Directed by Linden Little, this contemporary piece is sure to be an original and unique experience.

Then, on December 1-2, we continue our tradition of Theatre Unplugged with the student-directed one-act plays produced in the Studio Theatre (entrance on Joplin Street). The Studio Theatre remains the venue for student-produced theatre offerings. This year, seven senior theatre students will present their one-act plays to the public – totally free of charge.

In the spring of 2018, Gil Cooper directs one of the most famous farces ever penned with Noises Off. The play presents a cast of second rate touring actors rehearsing a flop called Nothing's On. It is a manic world of slamming doors, missed cues, and onstage-offstage intrigue. It is a perennial favorite and we are excited to bring it to the campus and community. Production dates are February 22-25, 2018. A great way to beat the winter doldrums.

In our final production of the season, from April 26-29, we present Gruesome Playground Injuries, by Rajiv Joseph, one of the most prominent new voices in American theatre. Directed by yours truly, this sweet and quirky piece follows Doug and Kayleen from the 3rd grade through the next 30 years, drifting back and forth through time as they compare the various calamities that keep pulling them together. The production features a unique staging technique where all the elements – make-up and costumes – are changed onstage. Close out your spring with this irresistible contemporary comedy.

Finally, I want to remind our patrons that Pitt State Theatre offers both Saturday and Sunday matinees for each of our productions in addition to our Thursday through Saturday evening performances. We have had many patrons tell us they appreciate the extra daytime performances as it is more convenient for them to attend during daylight hours.

I am sure the faculty, staff, and students of the Department of Communication and PSU Theatre join me in expressing our gratitude for your support and our sincere hopes that you enjoy the 2017-2018 season.

Director's Notes - Linden Little

Writing program notes is always a challenging task. I'm often torn between wanting to let a production speak for itself, devoid of my editorial voice, and oversharing the analytical details involved in constructing an interpretation of a text. I hope to avoid both extremes with this production note by simply sharing my advice to encountering this work.

bobrauschenbergamerica belongs firmly to the practices and conventions of postmodern drama/ writing. That means the play lacks a traditional narrative structure. Instead of trying to plot the actions of the characters into one single story, I encourage you as an audience member to engage in making your own meaning for each moment. You come to the theatre with your own life experiences, your own emotional life, and your own political perspectives. All of those characteristics are welcome in this production. In fact, they are celebrated by the scenes and characters you will encounter.

We as an ensemble don't seek to manipulate your responses, making you cry at something sad for example. Instead, we want to open up the world of the play to include you and your unique point of view. Through this invitation I think *bobrauschenbergamerica* acts as a balm for our increasingly polarized times. Perhaps through the joyful exploration of our varied experiences we might find a direction to move forward together into the future, or perhaps we won't. In either case sharing in the experience of this performance is with worth the attempt. At least it is from my perspective. I welcome yours with the following quote from the play: "We're all glad to be here with you tonight to share this with you and we hope you have a swell evening."

They are all at once familiar, but will represent different things to all of you, for even though our patchwork is the same quilt, each person's material is varied and beautiful, different, and absolutely, artistically... wonderful.
