### Director Note Megan Westhoff

Theatre is about sharing, whether it's the stories, the ideas, or the experience. Given the opportunity to learn about the incredible female astronomers Henrietta Leavitt, Annie Cannon, and Williamina Fleming has been a great gift for me and one that I have loved exploring with our students. We are fortunate to now share this haunting and beautiful tale with you, our audience. These women persistently pursued their calling without the desire for acclaim. They received little recognition during their lives, yet their discoveries would forever change the way we understand the expanse of the cosmos. This story of Henrietta Leavitt is based on fact, a little bit of dramatization, and entirely filled with hope. For a moment, consider what takes your breath away and then wholeheartedly follow what makes you curious because as Henrietta says, "wonder will always get us there."

Scenic Design Note Linden Little

Silent Sky is a contemporary play with a cinematic style. The script quickly jumps from place to place and from dream to memory. This dictates a scenic space that is open and flexible as each moment breathes into the next. The neutral foreground against the black background is a visual nod to the photographic plates of the Harvard Observatory. This color scheme also allows the star effects to pop into view, mirroring the excitement of Henrietta's personal and scientificn explorations. These lyrical moments are brought back down to Earth by furnishings with sturdy details. Carved wood and rich colors give us a sense of place with only a few pieces. This tension between Earth and sky parallels the struggle Henrietta and her fellow "computers" face as they challenge social and scientific conventions.

## Costume Design Note

### Lisa Quinteros

The beginning of the 20th century was a time of dramatic change. Invention, industry, communications, science, medicine, and even homemaking were swept into what would become known as the Progressive Era. *Silent Sky* starts in 1900 and travels through the life of Henrietta, to about 1920. In that span, people went from riding in horse drawn vehicles and lanterns, to electricity and owning automobiles. So too did clothes change radically, starting with large sleeves and wide sweeping dresses, narrowing to suits with tucks and overskirts with the advent of WWI, and into the slimline 1920's with flowing fabrics and shapely bias cut dresses. The world these women worked in was one run by men, and as such they were businesslike and tasteful in their manner and dress, as befitted their role in the workplace at that time.

Time is of such essence for this play, as the vastness of space and the immensity of star time contrasts the mere few years we have to discover and explore our world as individuals. The work of Henrietta Leavitt and these women are a celebration and testament to the fact that we all owe homage to past women scientists, educators, and individuals who initiate change and produce knowledge... as much as we do to those of today. Discovery extends and creates the world we live in today, and for tomorrow.

In another 20 years, clothing may be radically different yet again from what it is now, perhaps with complete biodegradable fabrics and personal forcefield coats or multispectrum-visible contacts attached to our virtual computers and phones in air in front of us. There will be different social structures and technology, ways of mobility, maybe eventually even life among the stars. Let's insure that like Henrietta, change we create at the beginning of the 21st century is worth celebration and remembrance, and be the life astronomers of today...for the stargazers of our future. My thanks to my crew. And all the Henriettas who helped me... become me.


