Assessment Strategies—COMM 535, Documentary Photography

Exams

It is not expected that high-value exams will be used for assessment in this skills-oriented course.

Projects

In addition to smaller, skill-specific assessments, students will complete three in-depth documentary photography projects. In each, students will work through a process of conceptualization and pre-visualization, planning, execution, editing, and presentation.

Rubric

Documentary photography projects will generally be graded according to the following broad rubric:

Full credit	All photos are suitable for publication without modification. Any differences between the professor's input and the submitted work are preferences—technically and journalistically, the photos are ready for the public.
90%	All photos <i>could</i> be published, but one or more have slight technical or storytelling weaknesses that diminish their effectiveness.
80%	All photos could be published but would require slight edits such as minor exposure or white balance correction, horizon leveling, sharpening, etc. and/or tell a weak but comprehensible story.
70%	Up to half of the photos have sufficient problems that make them unpublishable without serious editing due to issues such as incorrect exposure, inappropriate motion blur, etc. and/or do not tell a comprehensible story.
50%	More than half of the photos have sufficient problems that make them unpublishable without serious editing due to issues such as incorrect exposure, inappropriate motion blur, etc., and/or up to half of the photos are missing, and/or no clear attempt is made at storytelling.
0%	More than half the photos are missing.
