Dear David:

We (English and Modern Languages) are revising the existing Language Emphasis of the BA in English into a Language and Teaching Emphasis with a required education minor. To that end, we would like to require that students take PSYCH 155 as their 3-credit Wellness course under section G of the Pathway. We also plan to require PSYCH 263 and PSYCH 357. The goal of this revision is to create a degree program that will be comparable to a degree in Teaching English as a Foreign Language that international students might take in their home countries—with the end goal of increasing international student enrollment. Hence, the additional enrollment in Psychology Department courses would be predominantly in the form of international students.

Do you anticipate being able to accommodate additional enrollment in those courses? Obviously, I can't give you any very definite estimate of students other than to say that we are going to work as hard as we can to bring as many as we can, but my tentative personal goal is to work toward 20 new students per year in this program, which would mean approximately ten additional students per semester in those courses. However, we have no students at the moment, so this is a future projection, not an immediate need for seats.

Dear Janet,

I think that with our current number of faculty (2½ for Spanish and 1½ for French), there may be a problem to accommodate all international students in French 1 and Spanish 1, and in Spanish 2, especially in the Fall semesters when international students enroll so late.

MLL 479 is offered approximately every two to three years due to the very low number of students needing the class, but if we had an increased number of students needing the class, it could potentially be offered every other year.

If the ML program is allowed to go ahead with a Spanish search to fill Yasmina's position, the accommodation problem in French 1 and Spanish 1 & 2 would be greatly reduced, and it would make it easier for MLL 479 to be offered every other year.

Purpose/Justification for Proposed Course: This course is directly related to nutrition education jobs that are available in most communities. This course serves as a core course for the Nutrition and Wellness area of study.

- 1. Identify the roles of key macronutrients in the body including food sources, recommended dietary intakes and their utilization during physical activity.
- 2. Describe how macronutrients are digested, absorbed and the major functions they play in human metabolism.
- 3. Identify and describe the general characteristics and key functions of water-soluble and fat-soluble vitamins.
- 4. Be knowledgable of nutrient needs and health effects of each of the vitamins and how may impact sports performance.
- 5. Identify kinds, sources, and functions of minerals in the body.
- 6. Effectively assess body weight and body composition for health and sport.
- 7. Identify the principal water compartments in the body, describe the general function of each and explain how the body maintains overall water balance.
- 8. Be familiar with mechanisms of thermoregulation during physical activity including in extreme conditions.

- 9. Be familiar with sports specific nutrient needs for athletes.
- 10. Identify and effectively assess ergogenic aids and popular nutritional supplements.
- 11. Be familiar with characteristics of disordered eating.



Course Description:

Extensive study of sports nutrition incorporating timely research and evidenced based advice and recommendations. This course builds on the foundation established in FCS 203; Nutrition and Health, which is a required prerequisite.

Objectives/Student Learning Outcomes

- 1. Identify the roles of key macronutrients in the body including food sources, recommend dietary intakes and their utilization during physical activity.
- 2. Describe how macronutrients are digested, absorbed and the major functions they play in human metabolism.
- 3. Identify and describe the general characteristics and key functions of water and fatsoluble vitamins.
- Knowledgeable of nutrient needs and health effects of each of the vitamins and how may impact sports performance.
- 5. Identify kinds, sources, and functions of minerals in the body.
- 6. Effectively assess body weight and body composition for health and sport.
- 7. Identify the principal water compartments in the body, describe the general function of each, and explain how the body maintains overall water balance

- 8. Be familiar with mechanisms of thermoregulation during physical activity including in extreme conditions.
- 9. Be familiar with sports specific nutrient needs for athletes
- 10. Identify and effectively assess ergogenic aids and popular nutritional supplements.
- 11. Be familiar with characteristics of disordered eating
