### 1. Justification:

This proposed program will replace an existing program. Pittsburg State University has offered the Early Childhood Unified: Birth through 3rd Grade degree and teaching license since 2007. It has been a collaborative program offered by the Department of Teaching and Learning and the Family and Consumer Sciences - Child Development program. The PSU College of Education Teaching and Learning department has, with the introduction of the new Elementary Unified degree, selected to no longer offer the ECU Birth - 3rd grade degree. It has been the intention for many years for the Family & Consumer Sciences department to offer the Early Childhood Unified; Birth through Kindergarten degree. With the discontinuation of the Birth - 3rd grade degree and the support of the College of Education, the time is right to begin this program.

The ECU: Birth - K will fill a hole created by the ending of the ECU: Birth - 3rd program. It will capitalize on the strengths of our existing Child Development program and continue the collaboration between the two departments, but with the primary leadership shifting now to Family & Consumer Sciences. This program will run parallel to the Child Development program which is a concentration under the Family & Consumer Sciences major. The graduates of the child development program are employed in programs such as Head Start and community early childhood programs which do not require licensure.

The ECU: Birth - Kindergerten program will include the courses from the Child Development program that currently exist and, the courses in the existing Early Childhood Special Education minor, and will have added the Teacher Education courses needed for licensure.

This program prepares professionals to meet the learning and developmental needs of all infant, toddler, preschool and kindergarten-age children, including those at-risk for and with disabilities. Through an interdisciplinary approach that integrates developmentally appropriate child development, early education and early childhood special education strategies for young children and their famillies.

The program content knowledge and performance goals are aligned with the Kansas teacher license standards for the ECU birth through kindergarten (age 6) content area and the professional education standards. The proposed program was submitted to the Kansas State Department of Education for review and passed during the Spring 2019 review.

Students graduating with this degree will be able to work in programs serving infants through kindergarten that require a teaching license. Programs requiring a teaching license includes kindergarten, 4-year-old at risk preschools, & early childhood special education.

#### **Attendance Policy**

Since this is an on-line course, traditional attendance policies do not apply. For this course, attendance is best measured by your progress through specific components of each module and submission of assignments. While regular participation (attendance) is critical to your ability to do well in this course, it is your responsibility to monitor your attendance and ensure it is meeting a level necessary to perform at a level acceptable to you.

## **Classroom Conduct**

While there will not be a physical classroom, there are still some expectations regarding "classroom" conduct. Any interactions with the professor or classmates are to be handled respectably. In addition, students are expected to be responsible for their progress through the semester. It is up to the students to contact the professor through CANVAS or e-mail if they are in need of assistance with class material. It is also up to the students to manage their time. It may be tempting to focus on doing the minimum to complete the graded assignments and then prepare for the exam a day before exam date, but do not give in to this temptation. Trying to move through all the material the day before the exam is a recipe for failure. Make sure you are progressing daily!
