The Pittsburg State University Online and Distance Learning Committee was active for the 2020-2021 academic year. The committee members held eight meetings over the course of the year to discuss areas of opportunity for online learning at PSU.

Early in the fall semester, Dr. Howard Smith addressed areas of opportunity for online learning:

- 1. Online learning will become a part of the new strategic plan when Pathways to Prominence concludes in 2022.
- 2. Identifying undergraduate programs that are ready and willing to move forward with fully online degrees.
- 3. How can PSU's online courses support KBOR's initiative for every graduating high school student to have some college credits through concurrent enrollment?

Heather Eckstein, Director of Student Success Programs shared her perspectives in working with online students and the obstacles related to online learning. It was suggested to look at the D/F/W rates to discern patterns or areas of opportunity for online learning. Bill Hoyt generously pulled some data for the committee to review. Upon review of the data, it was determined that PSU needs to draft a distance education plan where the data could be of use. In April, the committee agreed to offer support in the development of a distance education plan under the guidance of Susan Dellasega. The development of the distance education plan will be a recommendation to the 2021-2022 online and distance learning committee.

To address the importance of online learning in the new strategic plan, the committee invited the faculty senate representative for the strategic planning committee, Dr. Casie Hermansson, to attend the December meeting. At this meeting we were able to offer our support to Dr. Hermansson during the development of the strategic plan as needed. This should be noted for the 2021-2022 committee for follow-up.

PSU Academic Honors Committee Annual Report for AY 20-21

The Pittsburg State University Academic Honors (formerly Departmental Honors) Committee reviewed, evaluated, and approved proposals for directed undergraduate honors projects submitted during the WF20 and SP21 Semesters. This committee comprised Dr. John Daley (committee chair and chair, CAS Arts and Humanities Committee), Dr. Daniel Zurek (chair, CAS Sciences Committee), Dr. Mark Diacopoulos (chair, College of Education Committee), Dr. Clifford Morris (chair, College of Technology Committee), Dr. Connie Shum (chair, College of Business Committee), and Dr. Craig Fuchs (Honors College, ex officio).

During AY 20-21, the above committees approved a total of 53 projects in WF20 and 48 projects in SP21. Of those, about half required modification or clarification before gaining approval from the appropriate committee. The University Committee also received two prospecti after the deadline in SP21, but unanimously elected to relay said prospecti to the appropriate college committees for processing anyway because of extenuating circumstances. I have included those two in the above SP21 total.

In my capacity as chair of the university committee, I coordinated the activities of the college academic honors committees and availed myself of Dr. Fuchs's extensive institutional knowledge and expertise on at least two occasions.

o The WAC committee reviewed submissions in the Fall of 2020 and Spring 2021 for Writing to Learn Best Practices stipend. For Fall 2020, 43 faculty received the WTL stipend and Spring 2021, 40 faculty received WTL stipend.

o The committee met in October to discuss course substitutions for Writing to Learn classes within departments. As discussed in the meeting, Writing to Learn began without rules or structure and then more structure was created in the form of the best practices grant. One impetus for allowing course substitutions is the potential end of writing to learn altogether should substitutions not be allowed as some programs are currently unhappy with the requirement and could push to end it. Concerns were expressed about the incentive to reduce writing if course substitutions were granted. It was not believed by Dr. Zepernick that course substitutions would significantly reduce the amount of writing students will need to complete. Challenges with this idea included allowing one or two course substitutions, who would decide if a course could be substituted for Writing to Learn (it was discussed the chairs and deans would make this decision), and course substitutions for one program may not transfer to another program if a student changes majors. The committee agreed to seek opinions and think on it before reconvening on December 3 to discuss writing a proposal to go before the faculty senate in the spring should the committee choose to do so.

o In early December the committee met to address the course substitution question. Based on the discussion, it was noted not all departments may be aware of the requirements for a course to be considered Writing to Learn without it going through the best practices. It was decided by the committee to discuss ways to encourage more Writing to Learn courses within departments. The committee discussed ways to better educate department faculty about the requirements for a course to be Writing to Learn.

· Explore the influences of diversity and multiculturalism in instruction, in the curriculum, and in the academic content of various disciplines.

- · Serve as liaison among the organized diversity groups on campus, including the Tilford Group, the University Council on Diversity, the Office of Student Diversity, etc.
- Develop curriculum resources which deal with diversity and cultural issues.

In looking back at work from the previous academic year that shared results from a survey, the committee felt that having access to events and resources focused on diversity needs at Pittsburg State University would be useful. For this academic year, the committee chose to focus on creating and sharing resources focused on diversity and inclusion as it's charge. These resources were items we wanted people across campus to access. As an important step in sharing these curated resources, we reached to the Tilford Group. Tilford was instrumental in helping us find space for sharing the diversity resources we gathered. The resources we curated can be found in the Canvas Page for the Tilford Group. We thank Tilford for their valuable service throughout this year. We hope these resources are valuable for Pittsburg State University members.

Constitution Committee End of Year Report for 2020-2021

During the 2020-2021 academic year the Pittsburg State University Faculty Senate (FS) Constitution Committee included James Whitney (chair), Hazel Coltharp (recorder), Chase Dearinger, Ruth Monnier, Norman Phillip, and Kent Runyan. Composition and roles within the committee were decided upon during an initial meeting held via Zoom on September 4th, 2021.

The Constitution Committee had two major accomplishments during the 2020-2021 academic year: 1) amending Bylaw IV.A #1-10 of the FS Constitution and 2) adopting Article III.E to the FS Constitution.

Bylaw IV.A #1-10 were amended to clarify that there are ten "subcommittees" within the Academic Affairs committee, which were incorrectly referred to as "committees" in the previous version of the FS Constitution. This amendment was discussed by the Constitution Committee during October 2020, with a first reading of the amendment occurring at the October 26th FS meeting, and the second reading and subsequent vote on the amendment at the December 7th meeting. The amendment was approved by the FS.

Article III.E was adopted to the FS Constitution to clarify the nomination process of the FS Executive Committee. Article III.E specified that there will be an election committee in charge of the nomination process for the FS Executive Committee. The Constitution Committee discussed this new article during early December, with a first reading of the article at the December 7th FS meeting. The article underwent further changes at this meeting, and then a second reading was held during the January 25th 2021 FS meeting. The article then went to a vote among the general faculty on February 15th 2021, and was approved on February 22nd 2021.

The Pittsburg State University Pitt State Pathway Committee was active for the 2020-2021 academic year. Faculty members used Zoom and email to hold meetings as needed. The initial meeting, to establish a chair and recorder were held via Zoom. All other meetings were held via email.

For this academic year, the committee considered 3 courses for addition to the Pathway. All 3 courses were sent back for revisions, and none were resubmitted for further consideration after revisions were requested.

Likewise, the committee considered reconfiguration of the Pathway – moving the Information and Digital Literacy elements to the Communication core instead of the Gorilla Gateway course. These elements would no longer be assessed in Gorilla Gateway, but in the courses within the Communication core. Senate took action at the May meeting.
