Description of Change: This revision reduces the number of electives in the required CORE classes for the major and simplifies and streamlines the method of selecting general department electives for the degree, which will allow students greater flexibility in designing their program with their advisor. The professional emphasis areas (concentrations) are revised and submitted along with this revision of the core and electives.
Rationale for Change (include changes to curriculum objectives): There are no significant changes to the curriculum objectives. The degree remains an integrated approach to communication with students having elective options that reflect both applied and theoretical approaches to the discipline. The revision focuses core classes on professional emphasis areas while, though slightly reducing the number of electives permitted, maintains a strong focus on promoting an diverse, integrated degree. This revision eliminates the confusing number of elective "boxes" that students had to negotiate (the revision of which was supported by the Registrar's and Degree Checking offices) and simplifies the advising process.

We do not anticipate GIT having an enrollment drop in GIT 221 and GIT 240. The COMM students who take those classes are generally GIT minors. We currently have approximately 15% of Communication majors with GIT as a minor and estimate that will continue or increase. The reduced electives in the core courses allows us to maintain continuity with students in the professional emphasis areas.

Rationale and Support for Revised Curriculum

Background

The COMM faculty began a review of their curriculum in August 2014. At that time, it was clear that industry shifts and technology changes had altered the types of positions available for our graduates. Terms such as "broadcasting" had become antiquated. Faculty began field research and exploration through conferences and research into other integrated Communication departments to determine what the best course of action was. We divided into committees to brainstorm a "new" communication curriculum. In August of 2015, the faculty met in retreat and began the task of putting our re-imagining into specific terms to reflect current practices. Implicit in this work of re-imagining was our goal of maintaining an integrated program, reducing the number of emphasis areas (6), streamlining our number of course offerings, and not harming any of the service courses used by so many of our fellow departments at PSU. The decision was made to hold off on legislating any changes until we could run the ideas past our various constituencies, including our mandated External Program Reviewer in November of 2015. With positive feedback from our external reviewer, we completed the work on revising our emphasis areas and tested against possible student scenarios to assure we maintained the mission and vision of our undergraduate program. The following are some of the ways in which we received feedback on this process as we move forward with legislation in Fall of 2017.

2015 External Program Review Recommendations

"Consolidation of undergraduate emphasis areas: Prior to my visit, the department was already considering some options for reducing the number of tracks at their retreat, and in their self-study. I would support their efforts in this direction...Combining into these four (*) emphasis areas helps to clarify, update, and strengthen the emphasis areas of the department. This gives faculty more flexibility in course assignments (if needed) and gives students more variety in their instructors. Also, it helps to ensure that each program is adequately staffed and has sufficient numbers of students. Finally, the names of each program are more contemporary and combine discipline elements that fit well pedagogically."

Dept. Note: At the time of site visit, we were considering combining media and theatre into one emphasis ("theatre and film"), but it became impossible to make that fit in any sensible pedagogical way. We wound up 5 instead of 4 emphasis areas (down from 6).

2016 External Advisory Board Meeting, March 2016

At the 2016 meeting of the department External Advisory Board, we presented our initial proposal for reducing and updating emphasis areas. The board was in support of this endeavor and we utilized breakout sessions for our board members to assist in providing feedback. It was determined that original "Theatre & Film" emphasis area would not work as planned and we returned to planning. There was strong support for the new "Human Communication" emphasis area, which business leaders saw as providing important skill sets for recent graduates on the market.

2015 and 2016 Student Advisory Boards and Anecdotal Evidence

The 6-8 member student advisory board was kept in the loop regarding our process in reimagining a new communication curriculum. Over the past couple of years, enthusiasm has been high, particularly for Multimedia Journalism and Human Communication. We are also noting the requests of prospective students about our curriculum and hear, on a consistent basis, an interest in strategic communication, multimedia journalism, and media production. We also have twice as many theatre emphasis students since the Bicknell Family Center for the Arts opened, which has helped confirm our efforts to increase the depth and rigor of our present curriculum.

Attached to this document are a copy of the present program and a copy of the proposed curriculum in order for you to see at a glance the changes we are moving through legislation.

Feedback from PSU Department Chairs

In the summer of 2017, the following chairs were notified of the impending changes in emphasis areas and asked for any feedback or concerns: Dr. Duane Whitbeck, Mr. Barry Wilson, Dr. Lynn Murray, and Dr. Barbara Bonnekessen. No concerns were expressed. Dr. Bonnekessen indicated she was interested in seeing more details because she felt some of our courses in Human Communication would be of interest to students in her department. In the fall of 2017, a "sneak peek" of the proposed curriculum was presented at the recruitment alignment meeting with the following chairs in attendance: Dr. Susan Marchant, Dr. John Oppliger, Dr. Duane Whitbeck, Dr. David Hurford, Dr. Barbara Bonnekessen, Dr. Peter Dvornic, and Dr. Pete Rosen. No issues or concerns were expressed. Dr. David Hurford later called to say how impressed he was with the new curricula ("exciting stuff"). Dr. Celia Patterson was also notified of the proposed changes and expressed no concerns ("It does look like a good, workable program that integrates and differentiates at the same time," per email on 9/7/2017).

Note: There are some submitted course changes (revisions, deletions) not directly related to the overall undergraduate curriculum revision but done in an effort to assure that our wording – course names and content description – is the most accurate possible to reflect current pedagogy and discipline practice in both undergraduate and graduate programs.

Purpose/Justification for Proposed Course: This course is a continuation of MLL 255 Spanish Grammar and Conversation land is designed for students who have studied language and cultures of the Spanish-speaking world for four semesters so that they can increase their skills in speaking, listening, reading, and writing. This course is based on conversational and writing activities intended to continue the development of oral and written proficiency as defined by the American Council on the Teaching of Foreign Languages (ACTFL). Topics include geography, history, entertainment, travel, politics, the environment, popular culture, and the arts. Discussions and writing in the target language will lead to learners' further appreciation of the target cultures. Spanish is the language of instruction. Also, this course is not a lecture course. Students may be able to earn retro-credits for this course.

Objectives/Student Learning Outcomes (as it will appear in the syllabus)

Students can increase Spanish proficiency in five areas: speaking, listening, reading, writing, and culture. However, the overall results in these areas depend primarily on the efforts of the student to speak, listen, read, and write in Spanish. Students will: (1) speak and write informally about a variety of topics and offer formal spoken and written presentations about specific themes without notes: (2) listen to native and non-native speakers of Spanish and respond appropriately in writing and in speech; and (3) read texts in Spanish and discuss/summarize their findings through writing and speaking exercises. The methods of assessment follow.

- 5. Describe the purpose of regulations that apply to programs of early care and education and the topics they address.
- 6. Identify the types of policies and procedures needed in family, staff, and administrative handbooks/manuals.
- 7. Identify the personnel needs of programs serving young children.

- 8. Describe characteristics of high quality, inviting environments that meets the needs of children, families, and caregivers/teachers.
- 9. Name the sources of income early care and education programs can anticipate.
- 10. Describe effective internal and external marketing strategies often used by programs of early care and education.
- 11. Identify some developmentally appropriate approaches to early childhood and child development.
- 12. Describe the role that early learning standards play in early childhood programming.
- 13. Describe the essential policies designed to keep children healthy while they are in out-of-home care.
- 14. Identify some of the strategies used for documenting and assessing a young child's growth and development.
- 15. Describe some effective strategies for building trusting relationships with families.
- 16. Identify opportunities for you to contribute to the field of early childhood and child development.

"The political science major must (1) complete the university's General Education requirements; (2) meet the distribution and hour requirements (36) in political science; (3) take either MATH 143 Elementary Statistics (substitutes for MATH 113 College Algebra in the university's General Education requirements) or SOSCI 388 Social Research Analysis..."

The current catalog states that the student must complete 33 hours in political science. The major is a 39 hour major. Currently majors take 36 hours in political science and take MATH 143 or SOSCI 388. Previously, the major also required majors to complete Introduction to Economics, but that requirement was removed in 2014 and replaced with 3 additional hours in political science. At that point, the 33 should have been changed to 36, but was not.

The current proposed curriculum reflects the correct number of hours and is merely correcting the catalog, not adding any additional hours.
