PURPOSE OF SOCIAL WORK

The purpose of social work is to promote or restore a mutually beneficial interaction between individuals and society in order to improve the quality of life for everyone (NASW, 1981). The profession of social work promotes or restores this interaction in such a way that in turn promotes universal social and economic justice and protects the opportunities for all people to live with dignity and freedom (CSWE, 1988: from DuBois & Miley, 1991).

At the baccalaureate level this purpose and its intents is operationalized through a professional change effort that reflects the generalist perspective. The generalist perspective requires that social workers rely on a common problem-solving framework and utilize professional knowledge and skills to address the unique characteristics of various social system levels, diverse populations, and the wide spectrum of practice settings (DuBois & Miley, 1991).

Generalist social work practice involves assessing, planning, and intervening with target systems in the broadest context possible. This contextual view allows the practicitioner to assess, plan, and intervene in a multifaceted manner. In so doing, the social worker can, through the assessment, planning, and intervention process, address multiple system levels that can include individuals, families, groups, organizations, and communities simultaneously.

MISSION OF SOCIAL WORK PROGRAM

The Pittsburg State University Social Work Program seeks to prepare baccalaureate level social workers who are capable of helping people enhance their human functioning, both individually and collectively, and resolve problems which prevent them from realizing their aspirations and achieving social and economic justice. Furthermore, the program seeks to prepare students whose practice reflects sensitivity to the impact of discrimination and oppression on at-risk groups, especially those in the Four-State area surrounding Southeast Kansas.

SOCIAL WORK PROGRAM GOALS

The mission of the Pittsburg State University Social Work Program will be achieved by:

- Educating social work practitioners for entry level generalist practice who
 are capable of effectively intervening with diverse client systems and
 populations at the individual, family, group, organizational, and
 community levels and who are dedicated to the values and ethics of the
 social work profession, social and economic justice, the value of human
 diversity, and continuing personal and professional development;
- Educating students for graduate study;
- Contributing to the advancement of social work knowledge and skills;
- Responding to the continuing education needs of practitioners in the Four-State area surrounding Southeast Kansas.

Graduates of the Pittsburg State University Social Work Program will be able to:

- View themselves and their client systems from an objective perspective and apply critical thinking skills as social work practitioners;
- Value diversity and practice within the values and ethics of the social work profession;
- Understanding the evolution of the social work profession, its current structure, the issues with which it has struggled, and the roles of key individuals in its development;
- Understanding the forms and mechanisms of social oppression and discrimination and make a personal commitment to advocate for social and economic justice;
- Utilize basic helping skills to develop and maintain professional relationships;
- Utilize communication skills differentially and appropriately with clients, colleagues, resource persons, adversaries, and members of the community;
- 7. Develop accurate assessments through the integration of relevant systemic data, i.e. community (economic, social, cultural), organizational, group, family, and individual (psychological and biological);

- 8. Intervene effectively as a generalist practitioner with individuals, families, groups, organizations, and communities;
- 9. Enrich practice through evaluating and incorporating relevant research from the professional literature and through evaluating their own and their agency's practice (under supervision);
- 10. Analyze the impact of social policies on client systems, professionals, organizations, the community, and the nation:
- 11. Demonstrate basic competence in the change strategies needed to advance social and economic justice;
- 12. Utilize self-examination, education, supervision, and consultation to continue to develop as a person and as a professional practitioner.

Each year the faculty as a group will:

- Develop and refine new social work knowledge, skills, and/or techniques and share these advances with their professional colleagues, including their students;
- 14, Advocate for social justice and human diversity as essential elements of a healthy community life:
- 15. Provide information and consultation to social work agencies and professional colleagues in the Four-State area surrounding Southeast Kansas:
- 16. Respond appropriately to the continuing education needs of social work practitioners in the Four-State area surrounding Southeast Kansas;
- Utilize feedback from students and colleagues, as well as developments in the social work literature, to continue to develop and refine the social work curriculum;
- Continue to grow and develop as human beings and as social work educators and practitioners.

COURSE DESCRIPTION

Social Work and the Law involves the analysis of the dynamic relationship between Social work and the American Criminal Justice system. This course will emphasize the legitimate role that social work plays when working directly or indirectly with the criminal justice system.

COURSE PURPOSE

The purpose of the course is to familiarize the student with the specific workings of the American Criminal Justice system and introduce them to methods of working in this very difficult area of practice. The reason this is important is that the nature of the Social Work Profession is to work with those who are disenfranchised by Society. A criminal conviction or even adverse involvement with the law often results in the individual being disenfranchised which, in turn, impedes their ability to operate in a lawful manner in society. Social Workers in the Criminal Justice System are charged with the responsibility of helping those caught up in the system to overcome the impediments.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

- 1. To introduce the student to the historical development of the Criminal Justice System, how the United States Criminal Justice System evolved, and in what ways the historical development of social work was compatible and incompatible with the Criminal Justice System's evolution (Program Objective 4)
- 2. To introduce the student to the various divisions of the Criminal Justice system of the United States and how each of those systems operate procedurally (Program Objective 11)
- 3. To make the student aware of the legal inequities in society and how the Criminal Justice System has been used as a tool of repression of certain groups (Program Objective 5)
- 4. To help the student understand that the law was the major vehicle by which disenfranchised minorities were able to obtain legal recognition of their civil rights (Program Objectives 2 & 5)
- 6. To make the student aware of how he/she can use his/her professional knowledge and skills to effectively work in the criminal justice system, to appropriately advocate for clients involved in the criminal justice system interact with the legal system to appropriately advocate for specific client systems and address issues related to social and economic justice and injustice as a result of being adversely caught up in the Criminal Justice System. (Program Objectives, 5,6,7,8 & 10)
- 7. To make the student aware of the importance of preparation for court bearings relevant to clients, focusing on assessment, documentation, and presentation of evidence (Program Objective 8)
- 8. To make the student aware of and to help them to understand the ethical and legal duties of the profession of social work in this particular setting. (Program Objective 3)

COURSE GOALS

- 1. The student will complete the course with not only an understanding but also an appreciation of the intricacies and power of the criminal justice system.
- 2. The student will understand the importance of appropriate interface between social work, social science, and the criminal justice system.
- 3. The student will have an understanding of the inner workings of the criminal justice system which includes terminology, the law which pertains to all facets of the criminal justice system and the procedures which are constitutionally necessary for the appropriate and lawful functioning of the U.S. Criminal Justice System.
- 4. The student will be able to demonstrate the above-mentioned understandings through class discussion, written exams, and researching various assigned topics.

METHODS

The teaching/learning methods for this course will include reading assignments from the texts and other appropriate materials, lecture, and class discussion.

In order for Plastics Engineering Technology minors to more easily take this class, whether traditional or transfer students, they may have to wait because the current Chemistry prerequisite is not offered every semester. With the option of another course, they could procede at a slightly faster pace through their Plastics minor. Since the proposed Chemistry prerequisite is offered every semester and focuses more on technology, we believe that it is a better fit for Plastics students, majors and minor alike.

Regarding PET 281 Plastics Testing Technology, the material covered in PET 281 is not necessary for students to successfully navigate the course material presented in PET 371 Thermoplastic Resins. For Plastics minors, it is an elective. The removal of this prerequistite will allow Plastics minors to take PET 371 Thermoplastic Resins without special permissions and allow a student to obtain a Plastics minor in a shorter period of time.

Two courses were renamed, PET 585 and PET 684 to support this content shift and I (introductory, minor), II (advanced, major) concept.
Rationale for Change (include changes to curriculum objectives): <u>Course content requirements have increased with the new developments in materials, manufacturing processes, and technology applications associated with Plastics deiscipline. The existent course content structure attempts to cover one complete topic area in one course and another topic area in a second course. However, the stubject areas are related so both areas are being covered in both courses leading to duplication of content without thurough coverage of any subuct area. The new course content structure will cover all subject areas as introductory topics in the first course and all subjects as advanced topics in the second course. This approach allows a streamlined system to cover the desired material without duplication and allows the Plastic minor to be difined as the introducory courses with reduced prerequisites and the second course to focus on advanced topics for the Plastics Engineering Technology major.</u>
