January 24, 2022

The Pittsburg State University Faculty Senate met at 3:00 p.m. on Monday, January 24th, 2022, with Shawnee Hendershot, President, presiding.

Past Minutes

Minutes from the December 6th, 2021 meeting were approved.

Guests

Dr. Winters submitted a proposal for a PSU in Paraguay Academic Achievement Award. The purpose of the award is to encourage persistence in the program. The award will be given to three students each term (January to July and August to December). International Programs and Services will fund a scholarship for tuition for one 3-credit hour course for each winner.

The proposal passed.

Announcements

Provost and Vice President of Academic Affairs – Dr. Howard Smith

It was reported that a new supply of masks have arrived and are available for staff. Two new programs are working their way through the KBOR approval process: the BBA in Business Studies and the BS in Computer Science. Several new courses were approved by KBOR for systemwide transfer. PSU did not submit a Business Law equivalent (one of the new courses approved) and will be submitting a clarification to the Transfer and Articulation Council. Systemwide General Education is still on the horizon. There's been a legislative request to submit all syllabi for courses taught in Teacher Education programs. The request stated the need for curriculum transparency. The Governors budget is positive for Higher Education. There has been discussion to freeze tuition for next year. There are still discussions regarding if this includes tuition only or also fees.

Faculty were reminded that performance appraisal reports are due today at 4:30pm. Negotiations will kick off next week.

Student Senate – Kaedra Brenner, Representative

Student Government Association encouraged faculty to apply for the Professors Beyond the Classroom Grant. The grant is to encourage professors to take their curriculum beyond the classroom and provide students with professional and personal development opportunities. It was announced that the committee met on January 5th and approved Bylaw changes and a new slate of officers for FY 23. Bob Frisbee was the guest speaker. Professional Development scholarships are still available. In addition, nominations are being sought for the VOYA award. One employee from USS and one employee from UPS is awarded. The next meeting is February 2nd with Provost Smith as the guest speaker.

Most cut scores begin at a 3 with the exception of some exams in Physics and Art that

are at a 4. It was also shared that there is now an implementation subcommittee working with the KBOR General Education subcommittee. The process is progressing, but slowly.

EXISTING

BYLAW IV – A. Academic Affairs

5. Online and Distance Learning Subcommittee. (See Article IV.B.) This subcommittee shall include one faculty member from each of the four colleges/schools, one faculty member from Axe Library staff, two faculty from the Faculty Senate membership, and two students. The Dean of Graduate and Continuing Studies and the Director of the Center for Teaching and Learning Technologies shall serve as an ex-officio member. This subcommittee shall:
 - a. Serve as a communications link between organizational units and Office of Graduate and Continuing Studies in regard to online and distance learning courses, policies and issues.
 - b. Help recruit faculty and other appropriate resource persons to participate in online and distance learning activities.
 - c. Participate in the formation, development and implementation of guidelines and procedures utilized in carrying out functions of the Office of Graduate and Continuing Studies regarding online and distance learning.
 - d. Identify areas/methods by which the Office of Graduate and Continuing Studies can increase online and distance learning services to the University. (Adopted 12/14/87 Amended 3/20/89, 5/11/98, Amended 5/7/18, 12/07/20).

PROPOSED

BYLAW IV – A. Academic Affairs

5. Online and Distance Learning Subcommittee. (See Article IV.B.) This subcommittee shall include one faculty member from each of the four colleges/schools, one faculty member from ~~Axe Library~~ **Library Services** staff, two faculty from the Faculty Senate membership, and two students. The ~~Dean of Graduate and Continuing Studies and the~~ Director of the Center for Teaching and Learning Technologies **and the Registrar** shall serve as an ex-officio member. **Additionally, the College Dean shall serve as an ex-officio member with this position rotating between the deans every 2 years.** This subcommittee shall:
 - a. Serve as a communications link between organizational units and Office of Graduate and Continuing Studies in regard to online and distance learning courses, policies and issues.
 - b. Help recruit faculty and other appropriate resource persons to participate in online and distance learning activities.
 - c. Participate in the formation, development and implementation of guidelines and procedures utilized in carrying out functions of the Office of Graduate and Continuing Studies regarding online and distance learning.
 - d. Identify areas/methods by which the Office of Graduate and Continuing Studies can increase online and distance learning services to the University. (Adopted 12/14/87 Amended 3/20/89, 5/11/98, Amended 5/7/18, 12/07/20, **XX/XX/2022**).

BYLAW IV – A. Academic Affairs

1. Online Undergraduate Curriculum Subcommittee. This subcommittee shall consist of five faculty members and one student member. Each school curriculum committee will nominate one of its members (normally the elected chair) to the Faculty Senate Executive Committee for appointment. The Provost and Vice President of Academic Affairs shall serve as an ex officio member. The undergraduate curriculum subcommittee shall review and approve or reject proposals forwarded to it by the school curriculum committees. It shall deal only with undergraduate curricular proposals and course proposals at the 699 level and below. (Graduate curricular matters, including the approval of courses at the 700 level and above, fall under the jurisdiction of the Graduate Council and/or graduate faculty.) The agenda and minutes of the undergraduate curriculum subcommittee shall be circulated to all members of the Senate, deans, and departmental chairpersons prior to the Senate meeting in which action on such proposals is to be taken. All actions of the undergraduate curriculum subcommittee shall be reported at the Senate meeting immediately following the circulation of the subcommittee minutes. Such action shall be considered final unless challenged by the Senate at the time of the subcommittee report. The undergraduate curriculum subcommittee shall also establish Senate-approved guidelines for its actions. These guidelines should provide the frame of reference in which the various school committees will work, as, for example: (Amended 4/15/91,12/07/20)
 - a. New program proposals must have Board of Regents' approval.
 - b. Faculty resources must be logically available for the implementation of curricular modifications.
 - c. Reasonable physical resources should be available.
 - d. Adequate library resources should be available.
 - e. Curriculum modification should make a discernible contribution to the academic program of the University.
 - f. New courses should not be introduced when existing courses may be modified and updated to include new materials.

Such action shall be considered final unless challenged by the Senate at the time of the subcommittee report. The undergraduate curriculum subcommittee shall also establish Senate-approved guidelines for its actions.
