Online and Distance Learning Committee met 09/08/2022

All designated members were present. Laurent Pretot will chair the group this year, and Krissy Lewis will take notes. Topics discussed briefly for further action this year included continuance of working out a Distance Learning Plan; further describing what Online Education should be and include; continuing to work with key administrators on any HLC or other administrative relationships, both for faculty and students. Laurent will work towards scheduling monthly meeting, and Krissy will get new folks set up with the Teams folders which have last year's working documents.

#### Academic Honors -

#### Items for Discussion:

- 1. Review of Academic Honors the policies and procedures and what the review committees are finding as the most common reasons for revision requests (grammar, spelling, missing information, lack of use of specific verbiage from the departmental/school guidelines.
- 2. Requesting that each department/school review their current guidelines and if they don't have department/school specific guidelines, that they develop them. That is helpful to the review committees. One issue we found was in Music. Senior music majors do not have any 3 credit hour classes that they can take for honors. Each of their classes are either 1 or 2 credits since 2019 when we had to meet the Regent's requirement for 120-hour bachelor's degrees. That makes it difficult for a Music major to complete the 9 credit hour requirement without taking two classes for honors in the same semester.
- 3. Academic Honors in the Summer session. How does this impact faculty? How does it affect review committees?
- 4. We are looking at clearing up the language regarding the deadline for submission of Academic Honors applications. The policy currently reads the Monday of the third full week of classes. Proposed new language is tentatively the 15<sup>th</sup> class day of the semester.

Many decisions need to be made, and some need to be made quickly. The most prominent decision was in regards to application criteria. The Honors College website needed to be taken down while this decision was being made in order to ensure prospective students clearly knew the criteria. The committee decided to keep the criteria as-is for the 2022-2023 academic year, with the purpose of reviewing the criteria and making changes if needed for the 2023-2024 academic year and beyond.

## ARTICLE 30. ACADEMIC MISCONDUCT

Education at the university level requires intellectual integrity and trust between faculty and students. Professors are obliged to master their subject and present as fair an account of it as possible. For their part, students are obliged to make an honest effort to fulfill both the letter and the spirit of course requirements. Academic misconduct violates both integrity and trust. It jeopardizes the effectiveness of the educational process and the reliability of publicly reported records of achievement.

Academic misconduct by a student is defined as unethical activity associated with course work or grades. It includes, but is not limited to:

- 1. Giving or receiving unauthorized aid on examinations.
- 2. Giving or receiving unauthorized aid in the preparation of notebooks, themes, reports, papers or any other assignments.
- 3. Submitting the same work for more than one course without the instructor's permission.
- 4. Plagiarism. Plagiarism is defined as using ideas or writings of another and claiming them as one's own. Copying any material directly (be it the work of other students, professors, or colleagues) or copying information from print or electronic sources (including the internet) without explicitly acknowledging the true source of the material is plagiarism. Plagiarism also includes paraphrasing another individuals' ideas or concepts without acknowledging their work, or contribution.
- 5. Unless otherwise stated by the instructor, exams, quizzes, and out-of-class assignments are meant to be individual, rather than group, work. Hence, copying from other students' quizzes or exams, as well as presenting as one's own work an assignment prepared wholly or in part by another is in violation of academic honesty.

The above guidelines do not preclude group study for exams, sharing of sources for research projects, or students discussing their ideas with other members of the class unless explicitly prohibited by the instructor. Since the violation of academic honesty strikes at the heart of the educational process, it is subject to the severest sanctions, up to and including receiving an "F" or "XF" (an "XF" indicates the "F" was the result of academic dishonesty) for the entire class or dismissal from the university.

When an instructor has a reasonable good faith belief that a student(s) has committed academic misconduct, that instructor, in accordance with their course syllabus, has the sole discretion to give the student an F on the assignment/test to which the student committed academic misconduct or an F for the entire course. If an instructor's response to alleged academic misconduct negatively affects the student's final grade in the course, that student(s) may appeal the final grade pursuant to the current Pittsburg State University Catalog's Grade Appeal process.

When the instructor wishes to impose an "XF", and/or more severe sanctions, he or she must first notify their department chair, dean, and the University's Academic Honesty Committee Chairperson via the institution's online academic misconduct form. In addition, the same procedure applies if similar sanctions seem warranted for a student(s) or former student(s) who have assisted in acts of academic misconduct.

For any Pittsburg State University Discipline proceedings, the "preponderance of evidence" standard of proof will be utilized. A preponderance of evidence standard evaluates whether it is more likely than not, based on the evidence available, that a violation occurred.

## **University Academic Honesty Committee**

The Academic Honesty Committee is convened under the auspices of the Provost. It is composed of nine members. The Faculty Senate Executive Committee is responsible for appointing six of these members. All must be full-time members of the teaching faculty. Members chosen by the Executive Committee serve staggered two-year terms. The Faculty Senate Executive Committee shall make its appointments at the beginning of the academic year. In addition to its six faculty members, the Academic Honesty Committee shall include three student members. Two (2) students shall be appointed by the Student Government Association. An additional (1) student shall be appointed by the Graduate Student Association. The students from both organizations will be appointed annually and at the beginning of the Fall semester.

The Vice President of the Faculty Senate will serve as the Academic Honesty Committee Chairperson. If the Vice President of the Faculty Senate is excluded because of possible bias, the President of the Faculty Senate will appoint a temporary chair. The Academic Honesty Committee Chairperson is responsible for communicating with the Provost on cases involving alleged student academic misconduct.

The committee may impose one or more of the following sanction(s):

- The imposition of a grade of "XF"
- Request the Office of Student Rights and Responsibilities place the student on Disciplinary Probation
- Specifically Defined Sanctions. Specific conditions given to the student, or student organization, examples include limitations placed on behavior, revocation of privileges, or an active obligation to complete a specified action, such as campus/community service, participate in educational programs, etc.
- Suspension. Suspension is a temporary disciplinary separation from the University involving denial of all student privileges. Suspension shall be effective on the date of notice of the suspension or later if so stated in the notice, and shall prescribe the date and conditions upon which the student may petition for readmission. Conditions for readmission may include, but are not limited to, disciplinary probation for a specified length of time; nonresident on campus; restricted visitation to specified University facilities; and a written statement from an accredited mental health professional or medical doctor verifying the capability of the student to function successfully at the University. Students separated from the University by suspension may not enter the University premises or University-related premises without securing prior approval from the Vice President for Student Life.

Expulsion from the university. Expulsion is permanent disciplinary separation from the
University involving denial of all student privileges. Expulsion shall be effective on the date of
notice of the expulsion, or later if so stated in the notice. Students separated from the University
by expulsion may not enter the University premises or University-related premises without
securing prior approval from the Vice President for Student Life.

The decision made by the Academic Honesty Committee may be appealed to the Provost. The following procedures shall be adhered to:

- Step 1: The instructor charging a student with academic misconduct shall submit a written request for more severe sanctions to the Chairperson of the Academic Honesty Committee, giving full detail of the alleged act(s) of academic misconduct and send copies of the request to their department chair and dean. The Chairperson of the Academic Honesty Committee will inform the Campus Judicial Officer and the other members of the details of the incident. The Campus Judicial Officer will contact the student and provide information on the student's rights, the allegations, and the procedures related to the Academic Misconduct Hearing. The Chairperson shall then schedule a hearing to be held within fifteen (15) business days from the time of the instructor's request. If the request occurs at the end of a semester, or after a semester has concluded, the Chairperson will schedule a hearing within 15 days of the start of the new semester (excluding June and July Summer Sessions).
- Step 2: The instructor, and student(s) charged with academic misconduct, will be notified of the time and date of the said hearing at least five (5) class days before the hearing is to be held. The instructor, and student(s) charged with academic misconduct may seek advice concerning the hearing from any person such as a faculty member or department chairperson. The instructor and each student(s) may also be accompanied to the hearing by an advisor of their choice. All hearings are record for future reference, only the University recording is deemed official. Note: The university attorney has the right to be present at any Academic Honesty Committee hearing.

The two parties, the instructor and student(s) charged with academic misconduct, may each request removal of any one member of the committee. This request shall be presented to the Chairperson of the committee in writing at least two (2) class days prior to the time of the hearing. After the request for removal has been made the chairperson will notify the individual and the respective individual will be removed from the hearing. In order to establish a quorum, there must be a minimum of five (5) committee members, excluding the Chairperson present. At least one of those must be a student appointed by their governing body.

 Step 3: The Academic Honesty Committee will conduct an appropriate hearing and may gather additional evidence pertaining to the issue.

During the hearing, the instructor, student(s) charged with academic misconduct, and witnesses with direct first-hand knowledge of the incident shall have the opportunity to testify (within the guidelines and time frames established by the committee). Hearings are administrative proceedings not legal proceedings. Cross-examination is the prerogative of the instructor, the student(s) charged with academic misconduct, and the committee. During the entire process the proceedings of the committee shall be closed and confidential, unless the matter becomes the subject of litigation.

- Step 4: Within five (5) business days of the conclusion of the hearing, the committee will render a
  written opinion concerning its findings, as well as a written decision to the Campus Judicial
  Officer. The Campus Judicial Officer will disseminate the information to the student, faculty, and
  appropriate University departments.
- Step 5: Upon notification of the imposed sanction, the student(s) will have five (5) business days to appeal to the Provost. This appeal must be in a written format and must provide detail for the reason of the appeal.
- Step 6: Once the Provost receives the appeal, he/she will have 10 business days to review the
  hearing and, in consultation with the President, render a decision. The Provost may uphold, or
  overturn the Academic Honesty Committee's sanction(s) or propose an alternate penalty which
  the student may accept.

## Removal of Sanctions

After two (2) years have elapsed, the student may present a written request for removal of the imposed sanctions to the Provost. If the request is not granted, the student may present up to 4 more requests for removal but in no case can the student present more than 1 request per year academic year.

If the request is granted, the student may be returned to good standing with the university and/or have the notification of the disciplinary action removed from their transcript, provided that no other sanction for academic dishonesty has been imposed in the interim. It shall be at the Provost's discretion to determine what fairness requires.

\*Women's and Gender Studies Electives: Must be selected from at least three different departments, with departments defined to include courses with distinct program designations (e.g., HIST, JUST and SOC). At least 15 of the 21 hours must be completed with courses numbered 300 or above, including WGS 399. Students may receive credit toward both their major and the Women's and Gender Studies minor for no more than one elective. Courses offered at the graduate level are typically available only to those earning the Certificate in Women's and Gender Studies as part of graduate or post-graduate studies. # Course Syllabus for ENGL 117 Introduction to Fiction (Genre)

#### This Course Qualifies as a Pitt State Pathway Course

The Pitt State Pathway curriculum serves as the heart of the university education by fostering interdisciplinary competencies that typify the educated person. It is designed to facilitate the development of key proficiencies including communication and information literacy. The Pitt State Pathway curriculum provides a transformational experience that challenges students to think creatively and critically, and to immerse themselves in the productive examination of humans in their global setting. By encouraging the development of skills that promote life-long learning, the Pitt State Pathway fosters a sense of personal responsibility, an appreciation of diversity, and an understanding of interconnectedness in our truly global society.

Catalog Description

An introduction to fiction, emphasizing literature as a reflection of culture in order to broaden students' understanding of the human condition via discussion and critical analysis.

#### Course Objectives

Students will

1. Understand their literary heritage by reading traditional and contemporary literature primarily in a single genre: poetry, fiction, or drama.

2. Recognize a global perspective of literatures and cultures through readings by men and

women in English and in translation from other languages.

3. Understand the readings through the use of other genres, film, or other media.

Nature of the Course

Each instructor will determine how best to implement the goals and objectives and how to teach the genres as above, but all students can expect that the course will foster critical reading and critical thinking skills.

Human Experience within a global context Essential Studies

Understanding the diverse nature, meanings, or functions of creative endeavors through the study of literature, music, theater, visual arts, or related forms of expression help us understand ourselves. Competency in this element means:

• Analyzing how literature, performance, the visual arts, or other creative endeavors respond to and influence society and culture;

• Analyzing creative endeavors in a contextual framework, such as critical theory, aesthetics, philosophy of art, or rhetoric;

• Demonstrating concepts that characterize a polycentric view of the world in contrast to an ethnocentric perspective.

Valuing different perspectives and analyzing the interrelationships between them leads to global respect and understanding. Competency in this element means:

- Analyzing connections between worldviews, power structures, or experiences of multiple cultures in a historical or contemporary context;
- Analyzing issues of diversity (i.e., religious, racial, sexual orientations, gender, or disabilities).

#### Methods

# Course Syllabus for English 121: Introduction to Anti-Racist Literature

### This Course Qualifies as a Pitt State Pathway Course

The Pitt State Pathway curriculum serves as the heart of the university education by fostering interdisciplinary competencies that typify the educated person. It is designed to facilitate the development of key proficiencies including communication and information literacy. The Pitt State Pathway curriculum provides a transformational experience that challenges students to think creatively and critically, and to immerse themselves in the productive examination of humans in their global setting. By encouraging the development of skills that promote life-long learning, the Pitt State Pathway fosters a sense of personal responsibility, an appreciation of diversity, and an understanding of interconnectedness in our truly global society.

**Catalog Description** 

ENGL 121: Introduction to Anti-Racist Literature. This course introduces anti-racist literature across multiple genres. This course is designed to increase students' awareness, knowledge, and critical skills related to racial diversity, human rights, social and economic justice

This course fits in the PSP Human Systems with the companion element of Social Responsibility in these ways:

When we read a play like "A Raisin in the Sun," we aren't just reading a play about a family. We are investigating systems of institutionalized racism, redlining, the great Northern Migration, Jim Crow, and also personal and social responsibility as seen in the movements represented by different characters and their choices. When we read poems by Phillis Wheatley, an enslaved person, but also poems by 20th and 21st century poets about or in the voice of Phillis Wheatley, we are also discussing these same systems. We are considering anew the role of Nathaniel Wheatley as depicted in Robert Hayden's eyes. We analyze a variety of perspectives.

Nature of the Course: Students will read and analyze original texts of literature with a focus on human systems, and students will be presented with historically and socially relevant contexts to understand intersectionality amongst various systems. Students can expect that the course will foster critical reading and critical thinking skills by applying cultural concepts and/or methodologies in the analysis of literature and through analyzing how literature responds to and influences society and culture.

Course Objectives and Goals: By the end of this course, students will

Apply multiple perspectives to personal, social, cultural, disciplinary, environmental, race, ethnicity, gender, nationhood, religion, or class interactions;

Analyze connections between worldviews, power structures, or experiences of multiple cultures in a historical and contemporary context;

Analyze issues of diversity (i.e. religious, racial, sexual orientations, gender, or disabilities).

Understand social responsibilities in connection with race and other diversities by reading and analyzing traditional and contemporary literature in multiple genres and from diverse cultures

Student Learning Outcome: Students will show ability to analyze literature and appropriate human systems.

#### Methods

To achieve our instructional objectives, instructors will employ lecture, discussion, and student oral and written response. Faculty may also employ some combination of other instructional methods, including worksheets, small-group work, journals, readings inliterary criticism, creative writing assignments, videos and films, out-of-class cultural events (e.g. poetry readings, etc.), inclass writing, panels, out-of-class responses, roleplaying, outside speakers, etc.

#### Assessment

Student work will be evaluated on the basis of examinations and papers. Faculty may also employ some combination of other evaluation methods, including worksheets, small group work, journals, creative writing assignments, in-class writing, panels, out-of-class responses, quizzes, etc

Representative Assignments in a WL section:

# Methods and Assessments including the Writing to Learn Statement of Intent and a Philosophy of Writing:

In this course we will discuss the literature you read for homework daily. We will use the appropriate terminology. We will spend class time on close reading. We will discuss the cultural context as well as the aesthetic aspects of the literature.

Additionally, you will write frequently as a way to learn course material. The writing will range from short informal in-class writing assignments and homework assignments, to short answer/essay exams, and to formal papers (an explication, and a research presentation). Expect to write about course content every week.

Writing serves several important functions. Writing things down helps us remember information. Writing also helps us work through our thoughts which helps us to come to a clearer understanding of our beliefs and ideas about complex issues. In this course we will write frequently as a way to learn course material. Also, you will learn the major concepts in this course better by writing about them and thereby taking responsibility for your own learning. We learn to write well by practicing writing and by expecting to go through several stages of process before coming to a final product. This is why you will sometimes be required to show me a rough draft of an assignment, and this is why you are encouraged to take writing to the Writing Center. You will receive written feedback on your writing in the form of comments on the

paper. When using sources, you will give credit for the words or ideas of others by documenting your sources using the MLA style of documentation.

Reading Response: Your job is to put the reading in context in a way that both helps you process the learning we're doing in the class (using new and appropriate vocabulary, asking relevant questions, contextualizing through research and making connections to other learning.

Reading Responses (Exploratory and Formal) and Quizzes: Exploratory reading responses (RR) are generally 1 and 1/2 pages each typed after reading assignments. These responses may be introspective and informal, but they must stay on focus. For a typical exploratory reading response, start your process by looking up the meanings of any words from the literature you did not know (don't just copy the dictionary definition, but decide if it's useful to discuss how the word works/means in context with the poem or story), go on to pose worthwhile questions about the readings, and then try to discover possible answers. While you may begin w/these questions or first impressions, your goal is to extend your line of thought beyond initial reactions. Try to not only summarize the poems but to talk about your thoughts on the chapter's reading overall and relate the works in each section to the terms and ideas learned in the chapters. Work where you have questions, curiosity, difficulty, or particular interest. Reading responses will be judged based on development of thought, focus on the assignment, clarity, coherence, and logic. I'm looking for development of ideas, risk taking in thought and logical thought in these exploratory responses. Feedback and Grading on RR: You will receive feedback when your work needs improvement. I will answer any questions you pose in the reading responses that are not covered in class. These will be graded based on if you followed the assignment and write reasonably clear prose. You will lose points if they're late, untyped, or too short (lacking development).

Thematic Analysis (WL Component; 4-8 p.): Focus on thoroughness, logical thinking, clear style, organization. We'll use the textbook apparatus on comparative analysis to prepare. For both essays, see "Writing about Literature" 1914-1934, "The Literature Research Essay" 1951-1961, "Quotation, Citation, and Documentation" 1962-1965, and "Critical Approaches" A1-A5 & A15-A16 & "African American and Ethnic Literary Studies" A20-A22.

Research Presentation: This assignment is part paper (WL component; 4-8 p.), part research project, part presentation to the class. The class will be working on research regarding Rankine. Each student will be responsible for a section of the book. You are expected to focus on one or two poetic elements for this group of poems and to focus on context. At your optional conference where you will receive feedback, I will need to see printed off sources (2-4), and a rough draft. You may want to include audio or visual elements in your presentation, particularly to help explain allusions and context for the poems you're presenting. The research for this project is minimal and may be historical, literary, psychological, or of any type that appropriately relates to your group of poems. In your paper and presentation, you do not necessarily have to discuss your whole section. But you may not organize your paper so that each paragraph focuses on a different poem. These paragraphs are not mini-explications or mini-reading responses, instead you will move to the more analytical stages of comparison and synthesis. Each paragraph will have a clear main idea that can be supported by looking at multiple poems. You will receive more information in class and through your textbook reading. Grading and Assessment: The writing component of a WL course represents a significant portion of the course grade, and a student cannot pass a WL course without earning a passing grade on the writing component of the course. Additionally, you must complete all major assigned work and tests in order to pass the class. You must attend class on test days and your presentation days in order to be eligible to pass the course. I will deal w/late assignments on a case-by-case basis, and I reserve the right to refuse late work. You will receive five grades; here's the breakdown:

- 10% Participation, Memorized Poem
- 30% Reading Responses & Quizzes
- 20% Research Paper

- 15% Thematic Analysis
- 15% Context/Research assignments

## Course Syllabus for ENGL 122 Intro to Women's Literature

#### This Course Qualifies as a Pitt State Pathway Course

The Pitt State Pathway (PSP) curriculum serves as the heart of the university education by fostering interdisciplinary competencies that typify the educated person. It is designed to facilitate the development of key proficiencies including communication and information literacy. The Pitt State Pathway curriculum provides a transformational experience that challenges students to think creatively and critically, and to immerse themselves in the productive examination of humans in their global setting. By encouraging the development of skills that promote life-long learning, the Pitt State Pathway fosters a sense of personal responsibility, an appreciation of diversity, and an understanding of interconnectedness in our truly global society.

**Catalog Description** 

ENGL 122. Intro to Women's Literature. 3 hours. The course introduces literature by women across multiple genres and includes major topics in feminist thought such as intersectionality, gender, women's bodies, activism, and considers political and social institutions that shape women's lives.

This course fits in the PSP Human Systems with the companion element of Social Responsibility in these ways:

When we read a story like "The Yellow Wallpaper," we aren't just reading a story about a woman's mental illness. We are investigating systems of institutionalized oppression of women, of what it means to be a full citizen, the roles of medicine within other systems. When we read "A Jury of Her Peers" or "Trifles" we are considering systems of justice through the lenses of the personal level, the humanitarian, and the citizen, and the law. We analyze a variety of perspectives, roles, and systems in works like these.

Nature of the Course: Students will read and analyze original texts of women's literature with a focus on human systems, and students will be presented with historically and socially relevant contexts to understand intersectionality amongst various systems. Students can expect that the course will foster critical reading and critical thinking skills by applying cultural concepts and/or methodologies in the analysis of literature and through analyzing how literature responds to and influences society and culture.

Course Objectives and Goals: By the end of this course, students will

Apply multiple perspectives to personal, social, cultural, disciplinary, environmental, race, ethnicity, gender, nationhood, religion, or class interactions and the institutions that shape women's lives;

Analyze connections between worldviews, power structures, or experiences of multiple cultures in historical and contemporary feminist contexts;

Analyze issues of gender and intersectionality (i.e. religious, racial, sexual orientations, gender, or disabilities).

Understand social responsibilities in connection with gender and other diversities by reading and analyzing traditional and contemporary literature in multiple genres.

Student Learning Outcome: Students will show ability to analyze literature and appropriate human systems.

#### Methods

To achieve our instructional objectives, instructors will employ lecture, discussion, and student oral and written response. Faculty may also employ some combination of other instructional methods, including worksheets, small-group work, journals, readings inliterary criticism, creative writing assignments, videos and films, out-of-class cultural events (e.g. poetry readings, etc.), inclass writing, panels, out-of-class responses, roleplaying, outside speakers, etc.

Student work will be evaluated on the basis of examinations and papers. Faculty may also employ some combination of other evaluation methods, including worksheets, small group work, journals, creative writing assignments, in-class writing, panels, out-of-class responses, quizzes, etc

#### Course Syllabus for Engl 123 The Citizen in Literature

#### This Course Qualifies as a Pitt State Pathway Course

The Pitt State Pathway (PSP) curriculum serves as the heart of the university education by fostering interdisciplinary competencies that typify the educated person. It is designed to facilitate the development of key proficiencies including communication and information literacy. The Pitt State Pathway curriculum provides a transformational experience that challenges students to think creatively and critically, and to immerse themselves in the productive examination of humans in their global setting. By encouraging the development of skills that promote life-long learning, the Pitt State Pathway fosters a sense of personal responsibility, an appreciation of diversity, and an understanding of interconnectedness in our truly global society.

**Catalog Description** 

ENGL 123. The Citizen in Literature. The course introduces literature that investigates individual roles and responsibilities of the citizen and considers the ways human systems such as class, race, and political structures interconnect at all levels.

This course fits in the PSP Human Systems with the companion element of Social Responsibility in these ways:

When we read a book like Claudia Rankine's Citizen we are asked not just to consider the consequences of microagressions but to consider how these microagressions can born of systems of government, business, class, and other systems of oppression, and how all of these things underly what it means to be a citizen for a person of color in the United States. Students are presented with a variety of perspectives in a text like this and are asked to analyze how various systems affect the individual as well as the larger society. When the women in "Trifles" uncover the motives for a crime, they consider their roles as citizens in a male-dominated society in a time when women's rights were subsumed by their husbands. The title for the short story version "A Jury of Her Peers" illustrates the failures of criminal justice systems for certain classes and groups, much the way Etheridge Knight's poetry critiques the criminal justice system as seen from inside the jail, and draws a line from the enslavement of African Americans to the prison system of the 20th Century. Literature, across a variety of cultures, is rife with investigations of citizenship. Students analyzing a work like Antigone or even Oedipus, must consider the role of government and the role of the individual.

Nature of the Course: Students will read and analyze original texts of literature with a focus on human systems, and and be presented with historically and socially relevant contexts to understand intersectionality amongst various systems. Students can expect that the course will foster critical reading and critical thinking skills by applying cultural concepts and/or

methodologies in the analysis of literature and through analyzing how literature responds to and influences society and culture.

## Course Objectives and Goals: By the end of this course, students will

Apply multiple perspectives to personal, social, cultural, disciplinary, environmental, race, ethnicity, gender, nationhood, religion, or class interactions and the institutions that shape the lives of citizens;

Analyze connections between worldviews, power structures, or experiences of multiple cultures and how these systems play on individual lives;

Understand social responsibilities by reading and analyzing traditional and contemporary literature in multiple genres.

Student Learning Outcome: Students will show ability to analyze literature and appropriate human systems.

#### Methods

To achieve our instructional objectives, instructors will employ lecture, discussion, and student oral and written response. Faculty may also employ some combination of other instructional methods, including worksheets, small-group work, journals, readings inliterary criticism, creative writing assignments, videos and films, out-of-class cultural events (e.g. poetry readings, etc.), inclass writing, panels, out-of-class responses, roleplaying, outside speakers, etc.

#### Assessment

Student work will be evaluated on the basis of examinations and papers. Faculty may also employ some combination of other evaluation methods, including worksheets, small group work, journals, creative writing assignments, in-class writing, panels, out-of-class responses, quizzes, etc

This course fulfills requirements toward the Pitt State Pathway. Wellness encompasses the concepts and importance of physical fitness and/or activity over the lifetime, chronic disease prevention/management, nutritional knowledge, mental health awareness, and continuous involvement in an exercise or physical/leisure time activity program to ensure students create a healthy lifestyle plan throughout their lifetime.

- Understanding chronic disease prevention/management;
- Understanding the principles of behavior and mental processes.

Student Learning Outcome:

 Students will understand wellness strategies for lifelong health through the reading of literary and other health-related texts. (Benchmark)

#### Course Description:

This is a course that is focused on the health and medical humanities. Our course will focus on an exploration of human health and wellness, including disability, chronic disease, and mental health through literature, as well as patient stories and narratives from health professionals.

#### **Course Objectives and Goals**

By the end of this course, you should be able to:

- Learn about health literacies to improve your own communication around health and wellbeing.
- Understand how patients are active agents in the seeking of healthcare, and think about the patient perspective through assigned readings.
- Articulate how literature and writing can serve as a way for health professionals to understand patients with empathy and care.
- Improve writing skills through examining and analyzing texts related to health and medicine, and creating written documents around concepts related to the medical and health humanities.

#### Course Assignments

All assignment descriptions are in Canvas and will be assessed using the <u>PSU Writing Rubric</u>. All reading surveys and in class writing assignments will be assessed by the instructor and given a grade of complete or incomplete. Feedback for all WL assignments will be included in the rubric in Canvas and shared in comments on the paper in Canvas. Because this is a WL course, all writing assignments must have a passing grade in order to earn course credit. You will use APA citation style and format for all written assignments.

- Reading Surveys: You will complete Reading Surveys over assigned readings to serve as reading checks over the course of the semester.
- Discussions: We will complete a number of Discussion forum activities in Canvas during the semester. Discussions may be reflective in nature, or ask you to answer specific questions in relation to our readings.
- Health Narrative (WL): Our first WL assignment will ask you to give an
  account of a personal experience related to health or medicine.
- Rhetorical Analysis of a Medical or Health Document (WL): For our second WL assignment, you will write a rhetorical analysis of a medical or health-related document. For example, this could be a website focused on a health-related topic or an article about health or wellness.

Synthesis Paper on Health or Wellness topic (WL): Our final WL
assignment asks you to write on a health or wellness topic of your choice
that presents two opposing perspectives. This assignment will consist of
two parts: a proposal and a synthesis paper.

• Course Reflection: You will compose a short reflection paper at the end

of our course for our final exam.

## Course Objectives/Student Learning Outcomes:

This course will introduce students to the genre of horror as seen in both fiction and film with an emphasis on the historical development of the genre. Students will analyze and write about horror within historical, theoretical, and formal contexts.

Over the course of the semester, students will be able to:

Describe the history of the horror genre.

Describe horror literature's subgenres and their conventions.

 Analyze horror literature within a historical, critical, and formalist contexts by reading traditional and contemporary literature in two or more genres.

Recognize a global perspective of literature and culture through readings by men and women from a
variety of cultures.

Express views on the horror genre both verbally and in writing.

## Writing to Learn Component:

Philosophy of Writing: Written communication is an essential component of any form of higher education. It demonstrates your ability to think critically and to articulate that thinking in a clear and understandable way. Also, literacy has become as important as ever in the 21<sup>st</sup> century; written communication is expected more than ever and takes place across a number of media. Finally, it's specifically crucial to the study of literature as well as most disciplines within the humanities. The material we're covering is complex as well as fairly subjective. Your writing provides me the chance to evaluate how well you're grasping the material.

Statement of Intent: The Writing to Learn component of this course requires that you write at least 2,100 words (roughly 7pp) of formal writing over the course of the semester. These will take the form of 3 700-word essays. Writing will be submitted and returned with my feedback on Canvas. Your writing will be assessed through a writing rubric, which is attached to the syllabus and available on Canvas. Due dates for formal writing assignments can be found in the course schedule. Because this is a Writing to Learn course, you must complete the writing portion of the class with a "D" average in order to pass the course.

Writing Center: Students are encouraged to use the services provided by the Writing Center. The Writing Center offers face-to-face and online consultations at any stage of the writing process for any type of writing. It is located in 112 Axe Library and online at http://www.pittstate.edu/office/writing\_center. Appointments can be made online or in person. All services are provided free of charge.

#### Course Policies:

Attendance: You have 5 unexcused absences (roughly 15% of classes). Each unexcused absence beyond 5 will result in a reduction of 5% of your final grade. University-sponsored events and religious holidays are the only

absences considered excused (I'll need to see something in writing). You must be engaged in the class to be counted as "present," too; if you're using your cell phone in class or talking with another student, I will mark you absent for the day.

Make-Up Work: Quizzes can't be made up; however, your 5 lowest quiz scores will be dropped. Essays may be submitted late, but will receive a 5% deduction from the essay's grade for each day late (including weekends). This includes lateness due to last-minute technical difficulties.

Communication: The easiest way to communicate with me is through Canvas, but email will work, too. I respond to messages and emails during office hours, but endeavor to respond within 48 hours (excluding the weekend). For more complicated issues and questions about grades, please see me during my office hours.

Extra Credit: You may revise the first two essays for additional points, but there's otherwise no extra credit.

Academic Dishonesty: I have a zero-tolerance policy when it comes to cheating. If you get caught cheating on quizzes or essays, you will receive an F in the course without exception. Use of sources must follow MLA formatting guidelines, and I expect you, as college students, to know what constitutes plagiarism.

Students with Disabilities: I will do everything possible to accommodate you if you have a disability, but I must be notified 2 weeks in advance by Student Disability Services.

#### Assessment:

Your final score will be the average of your scores in the following categories:

Reading Quizzes: You will take a short quiz each time there is a reading. Your quiz score average will also be used to determine the "reading" portion of your participation.

Formal Writing: You will submit 3 short essays (700-900 words) over the course of the semester. These will be scored according to the course's writing rubric (which is available on Canvas). If you are unhappy with your score, you have the opportunity to revise and resubmit your first 2 essays. You must see me in my office to discuss the essay to get credit for a re-submission.

Participation: You are expected to complete the readings, attend class, and actively engage in discussion. Doing all 3 will earn you an "A," doing 2 will earn you a "B," doing 1 will earn you a "C," and doing none will earn you an "F."

Knowledge about religion continues to be an important way to connect with, to understand, and to appreciate the varieties of cultural forms on this planet. ### Additional Details/Descriptions:

Course Prerequisites: In order to succeed, a student should have a basic understanding of the Windows operating system (zipping and unzipping files, opening and saving files, etc). Mac products may be used, but it will be up to the student to figure out how to install and maintain the software on his own computer as SolidWorks was designed for Windows. Use of Canvas and the Internet are required in this course. Any prior knowledge about drafting or other Computer Aided Drafting (CAD) packages (e.g. AutoCAD Inventor, Google SketchUp) is useful, but not required.

Attendance: The course meets for lecture 50 minutes three times a week. Attendance will NOT be taken for a grade; however, students are encouraged to attend at least one session Monday/Wednesday to cover questions regarding the week's tutorial assignment. Fridays will typically be reserved for quizzes.

Classroom Etiquette: Students are strongly encouraged to participate in the lectures through early preparation and questions or comments in class but are asked not to monopolize the entire class period. Students are required to behave in a professional manner and respect the learning environment of others. If students must come in late or leave early, please notify the instructor beforehand and do so in a quiet, non-disruptive manner. Please silence and store all electronic devices and refrain from engaging in distracting activities on the computers. The instructor reserves the right to remove any device deemed to be causing a disruption - this includes, but isn't limited to: cell phones, tablets, eReaders, eCigarettes.

Tutorial Assignments: Tutorial assignments from the textbook will be given most weeks and will be demonstrated via YouTube videos and in person; additional exercises from the textbook will also be demonstrated via YouTube. Some class time will be devoted to tutorial work; however, additional work outside of class may be required. Tutorials will typically be due on Friday by 5:00 PM, CST. Your lowest tutorial score will be dropped so no late work or make-ups are permitted.

Methods: Solutions to problems solved on tests and homework must be logical and based on the subjects of the course. A solution must be understood by the student, fellow students, instructor, and other individuals, today and in the future. A standard solution approach will be required to support clear and concise communication of information. A solution will include: student name and assignment title in the file name, expanded feature tree, Mass Properties/Center of Mass window, and should be saved in ISOMETRIC orientation at a zoom level appropriate to the given part. Solutions that do not follow the guidelines may result in no credit.

Quizzes: Quizzes will be given most Fridays during the regular class period. Quizzes must be taken in the normal meeting room/time unless arranged ahead of time via email. Material will include topics from tutorial work, lectures and textbook readings, as well as any additional material presented in class. Quizzes will generally be 30-50 minutes and will be closed book and notes. Your lowest scored quiz will be dropped and, therefore, no late work or make-ups are permitted.

<u>Final Examination</u>: The final exam will be comprehensive, covering all course topics. The exam will consist of both a written component and a SolidWorks component.

Team Project: Students will be divided into teams to work on a project that will span the entire semester. This project will be explained in detail during class sessions. Peer evaluations of your teammates' contributions will be part of the grading criteria.

Grading Policy: Students must maintain a passing grade in the following course categories: Tutorial Assignments, Quizzes, Team Project, and Final Exam. A failing grade in any of these

categories will result in a grade of D in the class, regardless of the grades in the other class categories. Grading policies and rubrics for individual assignments will be provided at the time of announcement.

Missed and Late Work: No work will be accepted after the given due date unless due to a documented medical necessity or a documented school event. With the exception of medical emergencies, any missed work must be discussed in advance through email.

Jump Drive/Cloud Storage: Students are required to have some method of storing all electronic files for the class. Saving your work as an attachment in an email to yourself is also a good idea for important work (team projects, etc.). Don't save work to the lab computers as it will most likely be erased by PSU administration.

<u>SolidWorks</u>: SolidWorks is installed in a number of labs in KTC. An installation link is also available to students for use on their own personal computers. Contact the instructor if you wish to install the software on your own PC.

<u>Canvas</u>: The course will be administered with the Canvas system. The site will maintain course materials and be used for communications, problem submissions and grading. The site should be checked frequently. The exams may be given in Canvas, so please make sure you are set up beforehand.

Academic Dishonesty: Submitting someone else's work as your own will not be tolerated in this class. Working together on homework assignments is encouraged, but EACH individual must show ALL work for EVERY problem themselves. Examples of academic dishonesty include, but aren't limited to: cheating on assignments or tests, submitting someone else's work as your own, giving your work to someone else, use of solution manuals/assignments from previous semesters, not citing sources on a writing assignment. Plagiarism includes copying from printed solution manuals, from other students, from the web, etc. Determination of what is or is not academic dishonesty is at the discretion of the instructor. If your work is considered to be an act of academic dishonesty all parties involved will automatically receive a zero on that assignment. Your actions could also cause you to receive an 'F' in the course and could result in severe penalties, up to and including dismissal from the university.

Communication Policy: Students are encouraged to interact with the instructor outside of class in person, via phone conversations and over the Internet; the preferred method of communication is via email. Questions sent via Canvas or email will typically be answered within less than 24 hours if received between 8:00am Mondays and 4:00pm Fridays; however, any questions asked outside of the "normal business week" may result in longer than normal response times. The instructor will not discuss homework/tests/assignments within 24 hours of the due date or 24 hours of when they are handed back. Feedback on quizzes and assignments will usually be based on the scope of the assignment; the rule of thumb is "however long you had to do it, expect it to take that long to get feedback."

<u>SPECIAL CONCERNS</u>: Any student who, because of a disabling condition, may require some special arrangements in order to meet course requirements should contact the instructor as soon as possible to make necessary accommodations; 7-10 days prior notice prior to an exam is appreciated to allow time to provide necessary materials to the Testing Center.
