

Bertoncino Joins FCS Faculty

In the midst of growth in the interior design program at Pitt State, southeast Kansas native Denise Bertoncino brings strong creativity, and design and teaching skills to the program. Her goal for the program is “to create visibility...across the U.S. to promote growth and to raise the standards within classes and on projects so that we may work towards FIDER accreditation.”

Bertoncino began her academic career at Pittsburg State University. While on a national student exchange to Winthrop, S.C., she so enjoyed that part of the country she decided to transfer. She holds a Bachelor of Science in Interior Design and Master’s of Fine Arts in Interior Design from Winthrop University. While working on her master’s degree, she had the opportunity to teach a course. In doing so, she decided this was her future. Upon graduation she applied for a teaching position at the University of Arkansas, Fayetteville, Ark., where she taught for ten years prior to coming to Pittsburg State this fall.

While at the University of Arkansas, faculty raised the standards of the program which became FIDER accredited. This, as well as her work with domestic and international travel to enhance student learning, were the two most meaningful aspects of her teaching career to date. She notes that “the difference in their (student) creativity for their projects was amazing” after such experiences. While in Arkansas she created an international faculty and student exchange program with Napier University in Edinburgh, Scotland.

When asked about her specific interior design and art interests, Bertoncino acknowledges that “space planning is where my talents lie. Without good space planning, you won’t have good design no matter how fantastic it looks.” Having participated in juried exhibitions, Bertoncino’s art medium is the development of wall hangings and floorcloths created using acrylics on canvas. She also enjoys doing small watercolors of places she’s visited in Europe on study tours.

Bertoncino’s interior design skills are invaluable as Chandler Hall faces major renovation in the near future. While at the University of Arkansas, she worked on the Classrooms of Tomorrow project, which consisted of selecting four prototypical rooms within the College of Agricultural, Food and Life Sciences and creating a series of designs with material boards, and specifications. Each one of these classrooms provided a different type of atmosphere; distance education, a

Dear Alumni and Friends,

Playgrounds “R” Us

Visions for the future can become a reality. They may take time but we need to celebrate the milestones as they pass to recognize how far we have come. We have been working to increase the visibility of the early childhood program and construct a suitable playground space for the preschool laboratory program. Years of effort are moving toward success in the form of a playground to be constructed in the space just south of Chandler Hall, where for years university greenhouses were located.

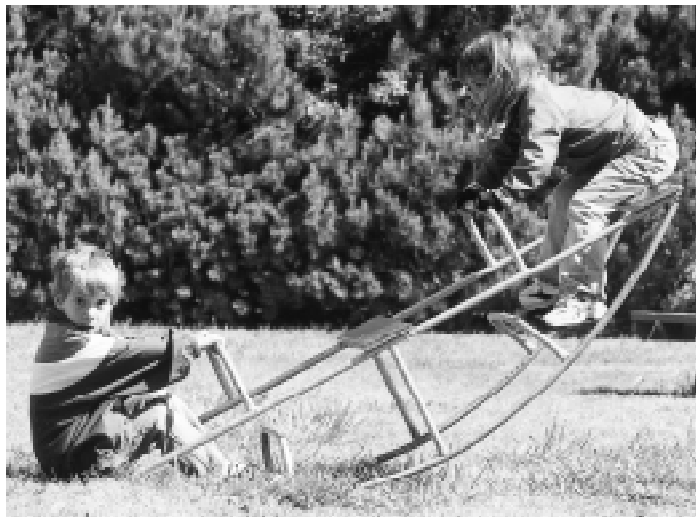
Over the past year the department received a commitment from the university for the area south of Chandler Hall for the preschool lab program. This area is ideally suited for a playground because of its proximity to the preschool’s main entrance. This will allow high visibility for our program that for 35 years has been hidden behind greenhouses. Removal of the old greenhouses occurred this fall upon the completion of new larger greenhouse space on the east side of campus.

As of October 13, all that was left was a patch of bare earth. We now can imagine how the playground will look one day. Construction of the new playground will be delayed for about a year for major renovations on the entire building including the preschool space. When these renovations are completed the playground will be built.

The vision: the preschool playground will be a multi-purpose space including a multi-purpose climber, bike track, sand box, patio with a shelter and a grass area. A new shed will double our storage space and a fence constructed around the perimeter will provide safety. The preschool program will be accredited.

Funding needed: the new playground will cost approximately \$25,000 with funds being raised through donations, foundation support, fees from the preschool program, fund raisers by Early Childhood Student Organization and special projects. We hope students, alumni, and friends of the university will embrace this vision as we move toward becoming a model program for early childhood education and care in the region. We need to start now to reach our goal of beginning construction on the playground when Chandler Hall renovation is complete.

Over the past year, several new opportunities presented themselves. Below are new resources gained through these opportunities.

- New sewing machines were donated by the Wichita Home Economists in Business organization.
- An AAFCS Massachusetts Avenue Building Grant was received to launch FACSNet to link PSU faculty and community college and high school teachers.
- An additional computer was added to create the third station in our expanding computer lab.
- \$1.3 million has been dedicated to renovate Chandler Hall. Relocation of the Department for a year will take effect immediately following the spring 2001 semester.
- An internal grant through Axe Library has been obtained to upgrade library holdings in our area.

Still, additional resources are being sought. In this newsletter you will read about plans to enhance the interior design program, addition of a permanent outdoor playground, and a list of anticipated needs for Chandler Hall following renovation. As alumni and friends, we will appreciate the contributions you make as well as referrals for other funding sources.

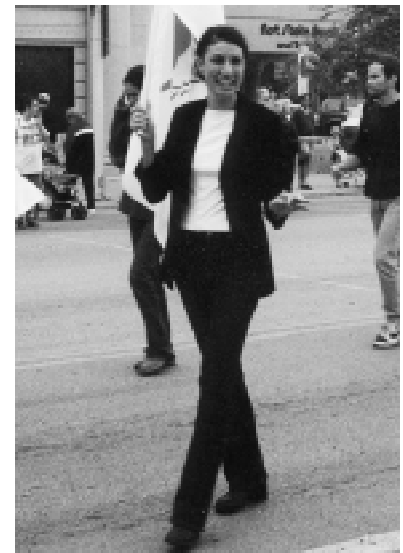

computer laboratory, a regular lecture room, and an auditorium. These are currently being used as tools for receiving funding from donors.

Believing that students need real life projects, Bertoncino has already involved FCS students at Pittsburg State in these venues for learning. She recounts an interesting and challenging project while at the University of Arkansas. She and her students did a casino project in a commercial studio. They traveled to St. Louis and Las Vegas to meet with two of the largest casino design firms.

An important question asked by parents and students alike concerns the employment future for interior designers. Bertoncino believes the field is wide open with “a place for everyone in interior design from being a sales representative for a large manufacturer to hotel design to designing interiors of airlines. The choices are limitless.” She does qualify her statement with the reality that “what a person does have to decide is where they are willing to live. Most commercial positions are located in a larger city.”

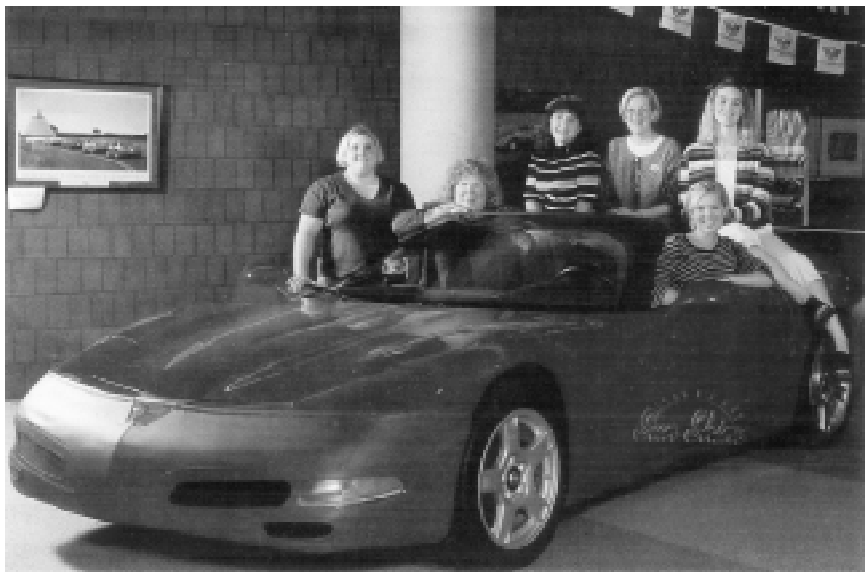

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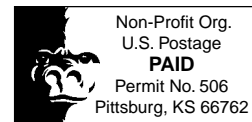
