## Plays well with others

One goal we have for young children is for them to "play well with others." Consequently, this goal applies to our early childhood development majors, but instead we call it teamwork and collaboration. During the spring 2011 semester some of the student teachers in the PSU preschool got a taste of the grown up version of playing well with others by participating in a mini-research project with Dr. Marti York from the Special Services and Leadership Studies department in the College of Education.

The student teachers collaborated with each other, instructor Dr. Amber Tankersley, lead preschool teacher Kari Cronister, and Dr. York to determine a skill that could be targeted for enhancement in the preschool. It was determined that the skill of writing ones' name was important for preschool age children and thus began the brainstorming of ways to add or "embed" additional opportunities for the preschool children to practice writing

their names. It was interesting to watch this project unfold as it began to consume much of these college student's conversations and work in the preschool even though it had no bearing on their grades.

This experience has provided many benefits to our students. First, it gave the students a glimpse into the world of action research that occurs throughout our careers within our own classrooms and programs. Second, it provided the opportunity for them to work with a variety of individuals on a project but each was able to contribute in their own way.

Everything you do communicates. The question is, are you communicating what is desired? When it comes to the fashion world, students learn that their ideas, knowledge and vision only go as far as their ability to communicate those things to others. The technological revolution has broadened the ease, but not simplified or reduced the need to convey important information. While it has increased the opportunities, it has often resulted in less thoughtful communication.

In fashion our students are actively engaged in creating visual presentations either through display walls, concept boards, illustrations, or more formal PowerPoint presentations. Effectively creating shared meaning including knowledge, values, attitudes and intentions are practiced through processes and products created for classes. # Interior Design is effectively achieving required skills

Twenty-first Century Skills that the Governor's Council thinks students should be learning are: critical thinking, problem solving, collaboration and teamwork, and effective communication. An interior design student's entire education is focused around each and every one of these learning skills, and they are implemented everyday in their coursework. What they are learning in school is a repetition of what they will be using each and every day in their professional interior design career. So why would the Governor's Council need to lay it out in black and white for educators? The answer might be because each program is applying these in a different way. Design students create designed environments for/with specific purposes and clients. Designers work through the design process stages: analysis, consultation, data relevancy, interpretation of the data, and synthesis. Each of these steps toward the final design solution meets the skill requirements of the Governor's Council.

Critical thinking helps to set solid expectations and keep a team on schedule. During a project students will re-examine a checklist to keep all parts of the project efficient. Problem solving uses discovery and analyzing to solve problems. Collaboration and teamwork is a cooperative effort by the group of persons in achieving their goal for the project. Effective communication is crucial in design work. A team's interaction will determine the success or failure of a project. It is the combination of all of the learning skills that develops a successful interior designer. The interior design curriculum sequences the learning skills so that the culmination of these is combined in the senior year to produce a holistic approach to the student's education.


