Preschool earns accreditation

We are proud to announce that the PSU Early Childhood Preschool Lab has earned accreditation from the National Association for the Education of Young Children (NAEYC) – the nation’s leading organization of early childhood professionals. NAEYC Accreditation lets families in our community know that children in our program are getting the best care and early learning experiences possible. Also important is that it means our college students are being trained in a top tier program from which they will take their knowledge and skills into a variety of work environments serving children and families.

To earn NAEYC Accreditation, the preschool program went through an extensive self-study process, measuring the program and its services against the ten NAEYC Early Childhood Program Standards and more than 400 related Accreditation Criteria. The program received NAEYC Accreditation after an on-site visit by an NAEYC assessor ensured that the program meets each of the ten program standards.

In the 25 years since NAEYC Accreditation was established, it has become a widely recognized sign of high-quality early childhood education. More than 7,000 programs are currently accredited by NAEYC – approximately 8 percent of all preschools and other early childhood programs. “The NAEYC Accreditation system raises the bar for child care centers and other early childhood programs,” said Jerlean E. Daniel, Ph.D., executive director of NAEYC. “Having earned NAEYC Accreditation is a sign that the PSU preschool program is a leader in a national effort to invest in high-quality early childhood education.”

Partnering with the community: Positive and lasting experiences for interior design students

The interior design students have been busy involving themselves with our surrounding communities both in the class and through their student organization.

The International Interior Design Association (IIDA) student organization created a partnership with the Joplin Habitat for Humanity organization to develop a set of layouts for two, three, and four bedroom floor plans. The IIDA organization committee was comprised of freshmen, juniors, and seniors students who developed plans that were then voted on by the committee. The top three were sent to Joplin for final approval of one plan. The project has been a great experience for the students by creating a mentoring structure for the underclassmen, involvement in a non-profit organization and a sense of commitment to helping design a home that will function for a deserving family.

The senior residential studio course created detailed comprehensive plans for the construction of Andel Village, an environmentally sustainable retirement community, and presented them to the Southeast Kansas Community Action Program (SEK-CAP) as a service learning project. SEK-CAP is a non-profit agency dedicated to uniting people and creating opportunities in southeast Kansas since 1966.

To meet the needs of the community, SEK-CAP wanted to develop an independent living community for seniors that was ecologically sustainable and integrative in concept. Though designed for construction within the city limits of Girard, Kansas, this living community needed to serve as a model for replication in other locations. Ultimately, this service learning partnership provided SEK-CAP with a turnkey, shovel-ready, community development project, and provided the students with an opportunity to put theory into practice, take an active role in improving their community, and complete a project that deals with a critical and current issue. The relationship that has developed between the Interior Design program and SEK-CAP contains the potential for more meaningful projects, and the experience gained by the students will serve them well after graduation.

Family and Consumer Sciences is proud to introduce the new degree option: Interior Merchandising. Interior Merchandising is the promotion of merchandise sales by coordinating production and developing display, advertising, and selling strategies for interior products including but not limited to furnishings and flooring. The program is designed to prepare students with a strong understanding of interior products such as furniture, textiles, lighting, and accessories, as well as all facets of the interior design retail industry. The program will emphasize promotion, display, and purchasing for interior products.

A common misconception is to confuse Interior Merchandising with other disciplines such as Interior Design, Fashion Merchandising, or even decorating. While Interior Merchandising is an interdisciplinary program; incorporating courses from Interior Design, Fashion Merchandising, and Marketing, the degree option and field of study has distinctly different program requirements, learning outcomes, and career opportunities. Visit www.pittstate.edu/fcs for specific course details.

The interior merchandising profession offers specialties in commercial or residential merchandising. Potential careers in Interior Merchandising include: Visual Display, Customer Relations, Merchandising Analyst, Marketing Representative, Product Buyer, Retail Manager, Sales Associate, Interior Product Specification Specialist, and Product Representative for products such as: kitchen cabinets, countertops, flooring, window treatments, office furniture, residential furniture, plumbing fixtures, or textiles.

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
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F.A.M.E. replaces Fashion Merchandising Association
