A little over a year ago we started the FCS Connect program where secondary teachers could sign up for monthly mailings of resources for use in their classrooms. We have participating teachers from Kansas, Missouri, Arkansas, Oklahoma and Wisconsin. There are multiple goals for a program like this. We want to get resources in teachers' hands more quickly so they don't have to do a lot of searching. We also want to provide them with information about our programs so they can help us to promote Pittsburg State University and Family & Consumer Sciences as a major. As of today, we have 166 teachers participating.

Program Changes: We discontinued our Fashion Merchandising program and instituted a Nutrition & Wellness major and minor. This degree focuses on Nutrition Education as there is an ever-increasing need for those with this specialization working with

KC trip

In October, Mrs. Sheila Cook and Mrs. Goldie Prelogar took a group of 10 students for a day of experiential learning in Kansas City, Mo. Of the 10 students, two were exchange students from South Korea, both enrolled in FCS 355: Construction Techniques.

In the morning, the group had a tour of the Federal Reserve Bank of Kansas City. Highlights of the tour included a peek into the vault, seeing large amounts of cash sorted and flagged to be destroyed, and students' attempts to lift a solid gold bar with one hand. Following the tour, they met with an economist for an in-depth discussion on the role of the Fed in today's economy and the impact on consumers.

Following the visit to the Federal Reserve Bank, the group headed to Rightfully Sewn. Rightfully Sewn is a non-profit with

lofty goals. They provide seamstress training to at-risk women as well as job placement upon their graduation from the program. Additionally, they serve designers with an atelier space (workshop or studie) and aspire to reestablish Kansas City as an epicenter of garment manufacturing. After discussing the social and ecological impacts of fast fashion, founder and President

Jennifer Lapka introduced Pamela Lucas, the Director of Curriculum and Instruction at Rightfully Sewn. Lucas, a graduate of the Fashion Institute of Technology (NYC) and a 20-year veteran educator, spent over two hours showing the group the industrial sewing machines, activities, and teaching techniques for garment construction.

Nutrition and Wellness emphasis

In the fall of 2019, the entire faculty worked together to "kick off" the new Nutrition and Wellness emphasis by creating the Wellness Passport Program. These series of wellness activities started with creating wellness journals that doubled as a "passport" for stamps earned from healthy behaviors and choices. On August 28th, Jamie Oliver, the Chair of the Art Department, guided students, faculty, and staff to hand-craft the passports. The passports included journaling prompts and adult coloring pages. On October 3rd, Dr. Shawnee Hendershot presented "Mental Health Awareness." On October 9th, we partnered with the Gorilla Pantry to host "Healthy Snacking" with plenty of taste-testing. October 16th Mona Rae Jurshak, a community yoga instructor led a yoga session in the historic Chandler Room. Additionally, there were on-going activities like "Fall into Wellness Bingo." Jennifer Murray, led a session on Healthy Crockpot Cooking on October 23rd. We ended the semester with healthy smoothies made using the Blender Bike which was provided by Tara Solomon-Smith of K-state Research and Extension.

with TFI Family Services in Pittsburg. During her time with TFI, she was able to ride along with caseworkers to observe family visits in the area and attend monthly meetings. Kieran also had the privilege of meeting some fantastic people along the way. Talking with the caseworkers at TFI, she was able to learn more about not only their job with families and foster children, but about the foster care system as a whole.

As someone who wants to work with children and adolescents in foster care, the practicum experience allowed her to see if this was actually a career path that she wanted to take, and "it only made me want it more." Through seeing the work that the employees at TFI complete, it helped her realize that although working in foster care is an extremely difficult job, it is also very rewarding.

"Many of the classes in our program not only prepare us for our future professions, but also prepare us for life", Kieran has said. "Everything from management to child development to nutrition will be useful for someone who wants to work with other people, no matter the age, as I do. There are also some classes like Family Violence and Child Abuse that I would whole-heartedly recommend to any student, no matter the major, because it gives invaluable knowledge over a very important subject."
