Note from Dr. Kahol:

I would like you to think about the use of 700 levels for graduate students and how the language is written in the catalog..."Primarily for graduate students, although some upper level undergraduates can enroll." It doesn't end there since it is further stated that "courses numbered 700-799 require 170 grade points." That is, in principle, a 4.00 undergraduate student can take a 700-799 course after just finishing 42.5 credit hours OR an undergraduate student with a 3.00 GPA can start taking 700-level courses after finishing 56.67 credit hours. Do you think such students are ready for the rigor expected in 700-level courses? I am also hearing that departments are having 700-level courses approved by Graduate Council and then they are using the approved courses predominantly for undergraduate students. I haven't checked how accurate this information is, but this would flout the premise that 700-799 courses are primarily for graduate students.

There was discussion regarding the current course numbering system. The discussion will continue at the March meeting since Dr. Kahol was not in attendance.
