# Pittsburg State University MA in History

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Thank you for your interest in the Master of Arts in History Program at Pittsburg State University. The following pages should answer many of your questions.

## **History Program**

Our History MA is a 30-33-hour program, depending on which of the three final assessment options you take.

- Option I Thesis: Students with strong research and writing skills and who want to move on to a PhD program should successfully complete a thesis. You will work with an advisor who agrees to serve as committee chair to complete an extensive research project. Thesis numbers may be limited by faculty areas of expertise and availability. This option is a 30-hour program.
- Option II Applied Research: Students who have chosen careers in education or public history (museum or archival work) are encouraged to complete an applied research project. This can either be a curricular project which involves creating a complete course for secondary education or community college or a museum project which generally involves historical exhibit planning, including deep research on context. This option is a 33-hour program.
- Option III Coursework: Students can also complete the program
  with coursework, especially if pursuing career options outside of
  history. This option requires completion of four seminar courses and
  is also a 33-hour program.

#### **Courses**

Our typical online offerings each semester include a variety of courses, including US, European, Asian, African, and Middle Eastern topics.

Graduate classes numbered 7xx are standard graduate courses. These are considered electives in the above degree plan and may be taught in conjunction with an undergraduate course.

Graduate seminars (numbered 813/820) are more intensive and are typically either readings or research seminars. A readings seminar requires a variety of readings over the topic, usually amounting to a book each week. Research seminars require students to conduct original research resulting in a significant paper over the given topic. Generally, we offer at least two seminars each semester: one in world history and one in US history.



# **Faculty**

We have seven full-time History faculty members, covering US, British, modern European, African, Middle Eastern, Asian, and World history. Our US faculty members specialize in such topics as politics, diplomacy, military, culture, society, and healthcare; our World faculty specialize in topics such as British political history, Islamic terrorism, and Japanese social history and migration. ## **Timing**

Courses during the Fall and Spring are sixteen weeks long. During the summer, our courses run four weeks. We usually offer at least one elective (7xx) course in June and one in July.

Most courses are online, and students are required to participate throughout the course. Course requirements may differ, but students should expect to participate in asynchronous online discussions throughout the week. Additional typical assignments include readings and quizzes as well as more rigorous assignments like book reviews and essays or research papers.

A full-time graduate student in History takes 9 credit hours per semester. The majority of our students, however, are employed; as an advisor, I recommend those students limit themselves to 3-6 hours per semester. Note that 6 hours qualifies graduate students for financial aid.

## **Admission Requirements**

Applications to the program will be evaluated by a committee of the History Graduate Faculty.

Students with a strong undergraduate background in history (at least 24 hours and a minimum 3.00 GPA in history courses) may be admitted unconditionally, or the committee may set conditions including minimum GPA performance to demonstrate fitness or completion of additional undergraduate coursework prior to or in parallel with graduate work.

Students with fewer than 24 undergraduate hours of history, or an average in history courses of less than 3.00, may still be considered for conditional admission (as above) if their overall GPA is 3.00 or above.

Overall undergraduate GPA must be 2.75 and above to be considered.

## **Applying**

If you wish to apply, please complete the Graduate School application, pay the application fee, and submit official transcripts.

Additionally, applicants must submit a personal essay: "Describe your background in history, your purpose in pursuing a Master's in History, and your expectations for the program." The essay should be sent directly to me at mkthompson@pittstate.edu.
